WANTED AMERICAN PRISONERS.

With the American Army in France, May 29.—By the Associated Press,—The purpose of the German attack today against the American positions near Bremenil, east of Luneville, was to capture Americans. The determined resistance, however, repulsed the enemy with heavy losses, and no Americans were taken prisoner.

The Germans attacked at three points, and at one point a group of fourteen got into the American trenches. Nine of the fourteen were killed, four are prisoners, and one is dead of wounds.

The prisoners reported that they were ordered to capture American at any cost, their superiors being anxious to determine where American troops are stationed and their present fighting strength.
