

RE-EXAMINATION OF DRAFTED MEN NOW IN PROGRESS

All Those Not Fit for Front Line Being Weeded Out by Medical Boards.

RUSHING PREPARATIONS

Speedy Work Ordered To Ascertain Physical Status of M. S. A. Men.

If any man has through an error or oversight been caught in the net of the military service act and is now in the net Depot Battalion, Western Ontario Regiment, for duty, when he was actually unfit for service, he should be notified by the medical board, for today the men who only passed the physical test are being weeded out by the doctors at the depot.

In accordance with the plans of the military authorities to prepare the men who have answered the call to service for a trip overseas with the least possible delay, the doctors are today giving the new soldiers the "once over," and if they are found to be physically fit, they will be sent to the front. Those who are not physically fit will be sent to the depot for further examination. It is expected that a number of men who were sent to the front a few months ago, but who were not physically fit, will be sent back to the depot for further examination.

After today they will be "all set," and their transfer elsewhere will probably take place as soon as transportation can be provided for them. Officers are of the opinion that they will leave London about the middle of the month, though no definite date has been decided upon as yet.

QUERIES ANSWERED.

Question—Would you give, in your opinion, the relative value of a hotel obtained in the dining-room of a hotel and a similar meal obtained in the grill room of the same hotel? Which would cost the most?

RE-ELECTED PRESIDENT OF SOCIAL SERVICE WORK AT TORONTO MEETING

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LIVES, MONEY, TIME, LOST BY FAILURE TO HAVE ADEQUATE ASSISTANCE, M. O. H. DECLARES

Present Measles Outbreak With 133 Cases in Week Caused, Says Dr. Hill, by Lack of Field Men—Three Doctors and Nurse Are Required.

No less than 133 new cases of measles were reported last week according to the health bulletin of M. O. H. Dr. Hill.

There were 130 cases isolated at home and five in the hospital at the end of the same week, and there were 94 houses in which cases were quarantined at that time.

In reply to the question, "How is it that there are so many new cases, and why is it that the epidemic has been allowed to get so widespread?" Dr. Hill, M. O. H., declared that there were several reasons. "In the first place," he said, "measles is a highly infectious for four days before the appearance of the rash. During that time the child apparently has a healthy appearance, and consequently is not isolated from playmates and other children of the household, while measles are still unsuspected."

"When the rash appears, a large percentage of people report the cases. We have reports coming in from the telephone wires all the time from the families of patients themselves. The usual thing to do when the case is isolated is to send a doctor."

"Most of the doctors report. Some of them, unfortunately, do not. It is hard to get evidence to this effect, but when I do I am going to get the doctors into court. Between one thing and another, a lot of infection is given to others."

"The second reason, not only accounts for the spread of measles but also the difficulty of keeping all contagious diseases under control in London. We have no whole-time men doing field work, no one available to do the extremely important follow-up work."

"We have five medical men who give us part time, one perhaps one hour a day; another 2 1/2 hours; another two or three hours; and the other two off entirely because of the demands of their practice or the fact they are out of town. The service, in consequence, is most irregular. Though it is costing a lot of money, we are not getting results."

Three Doctors Needed. "We need three whole-time men in the field all the time in order to cover the ground—one a medical school in the morning, and another two to look after quarantine and run down the sources of infection. When we had a whole-time man engaged he was able to look after quarantining to see that precautions were taken to prevent the patients communicating the disease to other members of the family and to look after giving permits to fully occupied with this he hadn't time to trace the causes of outbreaks."

The irregularity and inadequacy of our field service is responsible, not only for difficulty in keeping contagious diseases under control, but also for the loss of a great deal of time and money to the families where cases occur. Though we do all in our power to make it possible for workers to attend to their usual duties, at the same time insuring that no rise will be run of spread of the disease through them."

Declares Lives Are Lost. "Apart from the time and money, lives are lost, sickness endured, and frequently victims obliged to suffer physical hardships afterwards because we lack the adequate staff to do the work effectively."

In addition to three whole-time men, we should have at least one public health nurse, who would be able to visit the homes isolated, watch the cases, help the mothers with clean-up precautions, show them how to take care of the child, and minimize the spread of disease to other members of the family. While there were 130 cases isolated in the city the end of last week, there were only 94 houses. This gives some idea of the way cases have 'doubled up' or spread to other members of the family the same houses."

Other diseases are not numerous. They include 12 cases of chickenpox, three cases of diphtheria, a total of thirteen cases were in isolation at the end of the week.

Scarlet fever is apparently under better control, as there was only one new case reported during the week, although there are 11 cases in isolation.
