ARREST WINDSOR MAN, SUSPECTED BANDIT, BELIEVED DROWNED

WINDSOR, Oct. 9.—(Detroit authorities) started an examination of Harold Fontaine of Windsor, arrested here early today and turned over to the United States authorities, on a charge of smuggling Chinese into the United States from Canada.

Detroit police suspect that Fontaine is one of a party which attacked Inspector McCabe in a motor-boat at night in July, and who jumped into the river, and was believed to have been drowned, when the inspector died at him.

Fontaine was armed with two revolvers when he was arrested here. He is believed by Detroit police of having taken a part in the hold-up in Detroit of a gasoline station collector on August 18, when the collector was robbed of \$5,000.

DELAY PROLOGATION UNTIL AFTER DATE OF PROV. ELECTIONS

Unionists Do Not Want To Be Involved in Campaign.

REALIZE UNPOPULARITY

And Attendance in House Will Provide Excuse For Standing Aloof.

[Special to The Advertiser.] OTTAWA, Oct. 9.—Every effort is being made by the Government to spin out the present session of Parliament until after the date of the provincial elections. It had been anticipated that the force would end with the present week, but it is now announced that there will be railway legislation, and that the Government, in spite of the protests made in caucus this morning, will go ahead with its prohibition measures. It is scarcely possible that these can be disposed of in less than a fortnight, and by that time the result of the contest now being waged in Ontario will be known.

There are reasons for desiring that the session shall last until after the 20th: in the first place very few of the Government members have any desire to participate in the campaign. Supporters of Union Government are none too popular anywhere in the Dominion, and most of them realize that they would be better off out of the campaign altogether. Attendance at the House here will give them an excuse for remaining aloof.

A further reason, however, is that George Foster announced in the House this afternoon that the special committee on soldiers' civil re-establishment could not report for some time yet. There is a feeling in the House that either the Government or the Ontario Association of the Great War Veterans in the matter of further cash grants. The committee will likely report against such proposals, and may recommend instead a federal fund, upon which needy men during the winter can draw. But the Government would rather such a report should not go forward to the public until the election. So the committee may dwindle along a while longer, and the report will probably be delayed.

Legislation to enable the Government to arbitrate in connection with the Grand Trunk will be brought down, and it is liable to take up much time. Members of the majority talked plainly on the prohibition bills, and contended that they would have a prejudicial effect upon the House's character in Ontario. They declared that the referendum was quite complicated enough, without confounding the minds of the electorate further by new federal proposals.

Plenty of Time. A large number contended that such legislation had never been demanded. The Government, however, contended that Sir Robert Borden had promised it, and that his promise must be fulfilled. In an attempt to placate the rebellious spirits, they pointed out that between the time of the expiration of the existing war-time orders-in-council and the time when any province of the amended Scott act a very considerable space would elapse, in the course of which interprovincial traffic and mail facture could go merrily ahead again and depleted cellars refilled.

In any case, the Government contended that to withdraw the legislation now would be most humiliating, and would be wrong in construction. Members departed from the caucus in a gloomy mood, comforting themselves, however, with the reflection that the Senate might do something to take the sting out of the tail of the new legislation.

Some idea of the temper of the gathering may be gained from the fact that it took the Government just about four hours to secure a sufficient support among the members for its new measures in order to insure their passing the House.

"War" Expenditure Higher Last Month Than in Sept., 1918

OTTAWA, Oct. 9.—A disappointing situation in regard to the Dominion finances is revealed in the monthly balance sheet of the finance department. During last month the net debt of the Dominion increased by nearly sixty-five million dollars, as compared with an increase of a little under twenty-eight millions for the month of September last year. The net debt now stands at \$1,750,000,000. Before the war the net debt was \$335,000,000.

Last month's increase in the net debt was chiefly due to war expenditure and expenditure arising out of the war. Expenditure under the heading of "War" in fact, was about twenty-three million dollars higher than in September of last year.


