BOY HANGS TO MISHAP BLAME

Body of James Moses Found Near St. Marys—No Inquest.

ST. MARYS, Nov. 6.—The dead body
of James Moses, 15 years old, was found
hanging by the neck on a rope in the

The boy had been brought up on the The boy had been brought up on the farm where the tragedy occurred by his grandmother, now dead. His father, William Moses, is at present living in the West. The boy had lived on the happiest terms with his uncle, according to neighbors, and was popular in the neighborhood. The affair has cast a gloom over the entire community.

MAY PICK WESTERN ONTARIO MAN FOR **EDUCATION MINISTER**

Disposition Reported To Go Outside Toronto To Fill Post.

TORONTO, Nov. 6.—In connection with the forming of the new Farmer-Labor cabinet it is understood that considerable discussion has taken place with regard to the filling of the place of minister of education.

It is stated that in the conferences that have been held on the subject there has been a strong disposition to have the place filled by a man outside of Toronto, and it is known that one of the names prominently mentioned in this connection is now associated with the work of Western University at London.

The fact that so large a number of the supporters of the new government are from Western Ontario may prove an influence in leading to the choice of a man from that part of Ontario for the place. It is practically understood from the premier-elect's statements that he intends to go outside of the present membership of the legislature for a man to succeed Hon. Dr. Cody.
