## WEATHER IS HELPING

Bad Weather Handicapped  
Western Canvass, Now  
Improving.TORONTO, Nov. 6. — The Victory  
Loan total, as reported by W. S. Hod-  
gens, chairman of the Dominion busi-  
ness committee tonight, has reached  
\$253,783,600. The returns by provinces  
are:

The returns from Nova Scotia are up  
to Monday night. From British Col-  
umbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, Mani-  
toba, New Brunswick and Prince Ed-  
ward Island to Tuesday; from Quebec  
up to Wednesday night, and from On-  
tario to date.Toronto subscriptions today amount-  
ed to \$6,350,150, bringing the grand  
total for this city up to \$4,011,650. The  
Montreal total up to Wednesday night  
was \$52,634,400.Marked Increase.  
In all the Toronto districts today the  
canvassers reported a marked increase  
in the number of small subscriptions.  
Their total for the day was \$1,651,500.  
Information from various sections of  
the province and also from the West  
is to the same effect. The severe weath-  
er in the West for several days seri-  
ously handicapped the canvassers, but  
the conditions for getting around are  
better now, and results much more  
satisfactory. Edmonton is rolling up  
a big total. Up to Tuesday night sub-  
scriptions there amounted to \$1,230,620  
from 2,892 applications.Halifax is well on towards the \$4,-  
000,000 mark. According to a telegram  
received at Ontario headquarters today,  
the Halifax total was \$3,431,200.So far the employees of 134 indus-  
trial establishments in Ontario have  
won the Victory Loan honor banner.TWO SUBSCRIPTIONS OF  
HALF A MILLION EACHKINGSTON, Nov. 6.—This afternoon  
it was announced from the headquarters  
of the Victory Loan Committee that  
the Canadian Locomotive Company and  
Queen's University had each subscribed  
for half a million in Victory bonds. This

impetus to the local campaign.BOY HANGS TO  
DEATH BY ROPE;  
MISHAP BLAMEDBody of James Moses Found  
Near St. Marys—No  
Inquest.[Special to The Advertiser.]  
ST. MARYS, Nov. 6.—The dead body  
of James Moses, 15 years old, was found  
hanging by the neck on a rope in the  
barn of John Moses, his uncle, Wed-  
nesday evening, near here.  
The boy had been doing the chores  
on the farm about four miles north of  
here on the Central Gravel road, Downie  
Township. As he did not show up for  
supper a search was made. Life was  
apparently extinct, but medical aid was  
summoned without avail.  
The rope had been used for lifting  
hay into the mow. It is thought that  
he may have attempted to slide down  
the rope, and that the noose slipped  
over his head.  
Coroner Dr. C. F. Smith decided that  
an inquest was not necessary, as death  
appeared to have been purely acci-  
dental.  
The boy had been brought up on the  
farm where the tragedy occurred by  
his grandmother, now dead. His  
father, William Moses, is at present  
living in the West. The boy had lived  
on the happiest terms with his uncle,  
according to neighbors, and was popu-  
lar in the neighborhood. The affair has  
cast a gloom over the entire community.MAY PICK WESTERN  
ONTARIO MAN FOR  
EDUCATION MINISTERDisposition Reported To Go  
Outside Toronto To  
Fill Post.[Special to The Advertiser.]  
TORONTO, Nov. 6.—In connection  
with the forming of the new Farmer-  
Labor cabinet it is understood that  
considerable discussion has taken place  
with regard to the filling of the place
