COUNTY PUPILS TO PAY LARGELY INCREASED FEES

WINDSOR, Sept. 28.—Owing crowded condition of Windsor's public schools, caused largely by the influx of children from outside the city limits, fees of non-resident pupils will be increased from \$2.50 to \$7 per month after the first of the year, following the decision of the board of education at its meeting tonight. There is a total enrollment of 3,708 pupils, an increase of 600 over the enrollment of last June. The cost to the board of each township pupil is estimated at \$7.10 monthly, but owing to the large number of families attracted to the city during recent months who were compelled to move outside the limits for residences and would be affected by increased fees, delay in the adoptio of the new scale was decided upon.


