WHAT DO THE WOMEN THINK?

What have the women to say on the proposal that Canada build a Dreadnought to contribute toward the naval defence of Great Britain? What have they to say on the social life of Ottawa, the political capital of the Dominion?

What are their views on domestic affairs, on the franchise, on the building of railways, on the subsidizing of companies, on the extension of technical education and a score of other questions that from time to time occupy a conspicuous place in the public mind?

A portion at least of the women of Canada are eager to secure the right to exercise the franchise, and are not reluctant to express their views on the question of votes when given an opportunity. Why should they not be equally as ready to voice their sentiments on other matters of equal im-

The World believes that the women of this Dominion are well informed on public affairs, that they should take even a greater interest in live topics such as those enumerated, and that if given a chance they will demonstrate that they are quite competent to exercise the franchise judi-

ciously if parliament permits them to do so. With a view, therefore, of giving the wives and daughters of Canada the privilege of stating their opinions, The World opens a column which may be used daily by women for correspondence submitted on the questions foremost in the public eye. In order to make such a column valuable, it must be used without hesitation, for it is the first time that any large paper of Canada has offered women such an opportunity to prove that they read more than gossip on society and fashions. The World believes that to say women care for nothing except the frivolities of life is a

libel, and should be discredited by a free expression of views. This column is consequently opened, and all letters sent in, providing they are carefully written and short, will be published. They must be signed by the authors, as an evidence of good faith, and should not exceed
