CANADA'S EXPORTS RETAIN HIGH LEVEL

Total During Fiscal Year Socialist Party of America at Have Value of Over a New York Enthusiastically Billion Dollars.

Ottawa. May 9.—Canada's exported produce in the twelve months ending March 31. this year, was valued at \$1,239,492,098. For the previous fiscal year: the total value was \$1,215,404,-\$06. and for the twelve months end-ing March 31, 1918, \$1,540,027.80. ac-cording to the report from the Dominion bureau of statistics. 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




