# FLEMING SIGNS UP TO MEET KILBANE

For World's Championship at Grand Army Carnival at Exhibition Park.

The Grand Army has made the match between Frankie Fleming and Johnny Kilbane at 125 lbs. for the world's championship at the weight now held by Kilbane. The match was completed last night when Fleming signed up. They will meet at Exhibition Park in the same place as the Wild and Wallace, in front of the grand stand.

The directors of the Grand Army carnival, giving the following wire from Sergeant Jimmy Wilde, who is to box the American champion, Paty Wallace for the vacant title, at Exhibition Park, May 24:

"Philadelphia Pa., May 12, 1920. 'Major' Montgomery, director of Grand Army of Canada Carnival, King Edward Hotel, Toronto.

"I am standing to leave for Toronto, accompanied by Mrs. Wilde and my trainer, the 4.5 train Sunday night. This should arrive in Toronto about 9.30 (Toronto time), Monday morning. I shall be glad to meet you, so as to continue my training, as I want to make all preparation necessary for my championship contest."

"Jimmy Wilde."

The arrangement is that Sergeant Wilde will leave the following train at North York station. A sub-committee of the reception committee will meet him at the station and start for the city hall, where the reception committee, as a whole, will welcome him.

The G. A. C. band will head the parade, followed by several other bands, containing members of the reception committee, as well as many other prominent citizens.

"Dave" Devlin, Landman, who is to be one of the leading features, with his aeroplane exhibitions and stunts, during carnival week, is to meet the train bearing Sergeant Wilde and party at Hamilton, and accompany the train to Toronto. During the parade "Dave-Devlin" Landman will accompany the train in his aeroplane, about the city, giving many stunts and death defying exhibitions.

The reception committee comprises many notable men and others, including newspaper reporters.
