Power House Is Approved

But County Council Must See Plans Before Money is Voted For New Heating Plant; The Quarterly Meeting

A recommendation that the commissioners of the General Public Hospital be permitted to erect a new power house for that institution, containing also a laundry and electric lighting plant for the hospital, at an estimated cost of something like \$80,000 was given a general approval by the municipal council at their quarterly meeting yesterday afternoon. The vote of approval was limited, however, by the provision that the detailed plans and specifications should be approved by the council before the money is voted.

John A. Howard, elected at the recent by-election in St. Martin's, in place of the late Councillor Robert Connelly, was sworn in and took his seat. The warden was then attended to the fact that Councillor Thompson had forfeited his seat by absence from two consecutive sessions but this was smoothed over by voting the councillor leave of absence for the period.

Grants of \$1,500 to the Soldiers Comforts Association; \$1,000 to the Veterans Association and \$100 for the care of stranded foreigners were voted.

Attention was again raised the question of the county's claim against the city for \$8,000 overcollected on county warrants and moved for an investigation but found no support. He also charged another member, Councillor Shanklin, with saying that the county tuberculosis hospital was being used as a haven for hoboes and foreigners with only slight colds but the charge was not given serious consideration after Councillor Shanklin had explained his statement.

An attack on the methods of procedure in the appeals committee, by Councillor Dean, was headed off by the explanation that the appeals he referred to had been made by himself and not by the persons interested.

The warden, H. R. McElean, presided and the case present were: Councillors Hayes, Wignore, Russell, Fisher, Dean,

Golding, O'Brien, Bryant, Howard, Stephenson, Carson, Shillington, Shanklin, Thompson and Boland.

The finance committee also recommended that the bills of Messrs. Emery, Burley and Colter, of the assessors' office, for services rendered to the board of valuers at \$40 each, be paid on the certificate of the warden and secretary. The final recommendation giving permission to the Provincial Lime Company to carry a water pipe from Lawlor's Lake across Rothney avenue on deposit of \$80, the work to be done to the satisfaction of the councillors of the parish of Simonds, was adopted and the report as a whole was approved.

Assessments.

The committee on assessments reported that they had met on July 14, 17 and 18 and heard appeal from Rudolph Bedard et al. James S. Gregory, William Levi and William J. Dean. The committee recommended that the appeal of Rudolph Bedard be dismissed; the appeal of James S. Gregory be referred to the assessors of the parish of Lancaster and the councillors of the parish with the recommendation that a reduction be made on land fronting on Lancaster avenue, if it is established that the area will not measure out according to warden's estimate; that the appeal of William Levi be dismissed; and that the appeal of William J. Dean be allowed, and his assessed value reduced \$700.

Revisions not previously elected were selected as follows: Simonds, Councillors Stephenson and Shillington; St. Martin's, Councillor Howard; Musquash Councillors Dean and Thompson.

On motion of Councillor Turnkey Boves was voted an increase of salary to put him on the same basis as other turnkeys.

The county secretary asked if some arrangement could be made by which the officials would not be called upon at all hours of the day to issue checks.

The matter was referred to the finance committee with power to act.

The secretary's request that the chairman of the finance committee be authorized to sign checks in his place in his absence was also complied with.

King's Congratulations

King George sent a most congratulatory message yesterday to General Sir Douglas Haig, commander of the British troops on the Franco-Belgian front, for the excellent success that the troops are attaining in the big drive. The Emperor of Russia, through King George, also warmly congratulated the general and his advancing troops. General Haig made an appropriate reply to the King and to the Emperor.
