
AGED LADY SUFFERS

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
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VISITS ST. MARTINS

CANADA IS TO FORE
IN AERIAL SURVEY

Col. Ryder of London Lauds
Advanced Nature of
Work Here

Canadian Press Despatch—
OTTAWA, June 8.—"Canada is to
be the first of all nations of the world
in the matter of aerial survey," stated
Col. C. R. Ryder, of London, England,
in an interview on his arrival here last
night.

Col. Ryder stated that air survey
work in Canada was of a very ad-
vanced nature, and that they could
teach the other countries many things
in this line of work.

"I am a representative of the Air
Survey Company of England," he said,
"and I can truly say that I have come
to Canada with the greatest impres-
sion of the advanced nature of the
work here."

Col. Ryder came to Canada to study
air survey work here, and to see
what extent air survey work has been
engaged in.

CITIZENS MOBBED
COUNCIL CHAMBER

Perth Amboy Residents Wreck
Hall in Protest Over Tax
Increases

PERTH AMBOY, N. Y., June 8.—
When the citizens of this town heard
that their taxes were about to be raised
they did not wait for the ballot-
box to register their protest.

Instead they smashed chairs and
otherwise wrecked the chambers of the
Board of Aldermen and it took twenty
men to restore order among the
1,000 people who held a demonstration
at the City Hall.

At a meeting of the aldermen last
night, it was revealed that taxes had
to be increased to cover a deficit of
\$181,000 and pay for \$150,000 new pav-
ing.

Somebody said the financial affairs
of the city were poorly run.

"Why don't you pay your rent and
keep quiet?" an alderman answered
the critic. An then the fight was on.

SABBATH SCHOOLS
WORK IS TOLD OF

Presbyterian Assembly Hears
Objections to Book For
Children

MONTREAL, June 8.—The story
of the organization of the Sabbath
schools of the Presbyterian Church of
Canada, from the chaotic condition in
which they were left by the dis-
solution of church union, until they
now number 838 schools, with an en-
rollment of 108,726, was told to the
General Assembly last night by Rev.
W. M. Kannawin, Hamilton and Rev.
Norman MacEachern, Winnipeg.

To Mr. Kannawin, convener of the
board of Sabbath schools and Young
Peoples Societies, Mr. MacEachern
gave the credit for this task. The
former had accomplished the work, he
said, while carrying on his regular
church and Presbytery duties, and the
board recommended that Mr. Kanna-
win be relieved of these latter. A
salary of \$4,000 per year, was recom-
mended. The assembly will pass on
the recommendation today.

OBJECTS TO BOOKS

Somewhat of a tempest was caused
in the assembly last night, when W. W.
Fraser, Vancouver, B. C., brought at-
tention to a book included in the list
recommended to young people. This
publication, "The Story of Our Bible,"
by H. S. Huntley, Mr. Fraser inter-
preted as casting doubt on the divinity
of Christ, and read selections which
he felt supported his interpretation.

ASSEMBLY FUND IS
HOPED FOR WIDOWS

Plan Likely to be Placed
Before Presbyterians
Next Year

Canadian Press Despatch.
MONTREAL, June 7.—The joint
committee of the aged Ministers' and
Widows' and Orphans' Funds hope to
present for approval to the General
Assembly of the Presbyterian Church
in Canada next year a plan for the
creation of a new fund according to
the provisions adopted by the assembly
of 1921.

This was stated to the present as-
sembly tonight by Rev. D. T. Mc-
Kerrell, convener, and the committee
was authorized to go ahead with the
project. Under the 1921 plan an an-
nual retiring allowance would be pro-
vided of at least \$1,000 per year for
ministers aged 70 years or over, or
who had given the church 40 years of
service, and an annuity of \$300 to
ministers' widows. An assessment
would be made on every congregation
to be based upon stipend paid by the
congregation, such assessment, how-
ever, to be a first charge upon revenue of the con-
gregation.
