German Jockeys Poorly Paid.
Berlin, April 28.—(A. P. By Mail)—Jockeys in Germany get about forty or fifty cents a race, with a small percentage added for riding a winning mount, under the terms of a new tariff. The schedule prescribes 10,000 marks for every flat race rider, and 12,000 for each steeplechase. If he wins, the jockey gets two per cent. of the purse. Apprentice jockeys are paid half the rate of the "regulars" and their share in any first purse won is one-fourth of one per cent.
