REFUGEE CHINESE TURNED OUT OF PEKIN HOTEL

Action Result of Conference
of British, French and Am-
erican Diplomats.

Peking, Sept. 1.—(Associated Press Cor-
respondence)—Representatives of Am-
erica, France and Great Britain took con-
certed action at an informal meeting of
the diplomatic corps a few days ago
calling to consider what steps should be
taken in view of the practical certainty
that the defeated Anfu leaders would
seek refuge in the legations. The diplo-
mats did not announce what course they

would pursue with respect to giving
asylum, in case it were demanded, in the
legations proper, but sent notices to their
nationals residing in the legation quarter
calling attention to a clause in the proto-
col of 1900 prohibiting the residence of
Chinese, other than employees, in the
quarter.

Inasmuch as the notices were sent to
secretaries and clerks of legations the
action was generally regarded as tantamount
to notice that such refugees would
not be received in the legations.

Although most of the legations were
represented at the meeting, the other
ministers reserved the right to take in-
dividual action. Dr. C. D. Toney, coun-
cillor, represented the American legation
in the absence of Minister Crane.

Practically the only institution affected
by the decision of the three ministers was
the British-owned Hotel Wagons-Lits,
which had become the haven of Chinese
who feared that they might suffer at the
hands of looters or otherwise. The male
contingent of these refugees were given
forty-eight hours in which to vacate.
The rule did not apply to women and
children, many of whom stayed on.

NO FEAR OF BOLSHEVISM IN GERMANY

German Delegate to Com-
munist Conference Says the
Country Could Not Submit
to Dictates of Few.

Berlin, Sept. 18.—(Associated Press
Correspondence)—Only romancers and
dreamers believe that the Russian Red
army will eventually strike at Germany
and seek to establish a soviet here with
the aid of which it will make war on
France, declares Wilhelm Dittman, an
independent Socialist member of the
Reichstag.

Dittman, who was one of the German
delegates to the Moscow communist con-
gress, in an article in the Freiheit, turns
upon Bolshevism, which, he declares, is
an impossible system which can exist
only in Russia because of the "crass
ignorance of the Russian peasants."

"German workmen," he goes on, "who
are not two-legged beasts but upstand-
ing human beings, would never submit
to the dictatorship of a few." He says
they have nothing in common with men
who "are neither socialists nor commu-
nists and generally have only a vague
understanding of politics, government
and society."

"They are mostly unable to read and
write," Dittman continues, "and their
horizon hardly extends beyond their own
thresholds, as might have been the case
of the German peasants of the middle
ages. And these men constitute seventy-
five per cent. of the entire population of
the country."
