Robinson, of Moncton, and Abner E. Bartlett, of Riverside, including the following: Lot of land in Station street, Riverside, to Clarence Payne for twenty-five dollars; house to David Rossiter, \$600; house in Stuart street, Riverside, to Peter Turner for \$2,000; lot of undeveloped marsh to Edmond, Albert, to C. R. Beaumont, \$785; thirty acres of marsh in Hopewell, to Clifford C. West, \$1,025; fourteen acres marsh in Hopewell to Joseph Turner, \$200; twenty-five acres marsh in Hopewell to Warren Downey, \$800; twelve acres marsh in Hopewell to Warren Downey, \$295; forty-five acres marsh in Hopewell to Howard Stevens, for \$800; six acres marsh in Harvey to Walter Tingley, fifty-five dollars; one acre marsh in Harvey to Phillip McCarron, for fourteen dollars; fifty acres of timber without land in New Ireland to Martin Barrett, \$125; wharf at Riverside to Captain H. A. Turner, seventy-five dollars; house at Albert to David Rossiter, \$550; house in Forest Dale street, Albert, to Albert Smith, \$200.

M. D. Fullerton acted as auctioneer. There was some lively bidding, especially for some of the marsh lots. It is understood that a further sale of real estate belonging to the late lieutenant-governor is to take place later.

AN INTERESTING DECISION.

An interesting decision has just been given by the Supreme Court of Canada. Word has been received in Moncton that in the Albert county case of McClellan vs. Downey, a dispute in connection with certain marsh rights, the court has given judgment for the defendants. This case has been watched with keen interest by lawyers and others and the final decision of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick. M. G. Todd, K.C., St. John, acted for the plaintiffs, and Dr. J. B. M. Baxter, K.C., for the defendants.

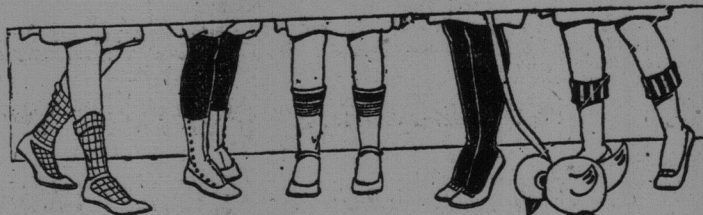

Versailles, May 22.—(By The Associated Press.)—The German delegation summoned from Berlin for a consultation Carl Kautsky, the German Independent Socialist leader; Herr Pauli, of the German foreign office, the head of the German General Electric Company; and other experts also have been called from Berlin. They are expected today or tomorrow.

PROPOSED REFORM OF GOVERNMENT OF INDIA.

London, May 22.—Edwin Samuel Montague, secretary for India, announced in

the House of Commons yesterday that he hoped to introduce early in June a government bill for the reform of the government of India. He said the key-stone would be the transference of power from the bureaucracy to the people, which he added, "may perhaps be gradual, but real at every stage."
