## LOCAL NEWS

### THEIR CHILD DEAD

### CHANGES IN EFFECT

William S. Emery, who was recently appointed manager of the C. P. R. telephone office in Halifax, left at noon today to take over his new duties. He had been in charge of the local office for three years. J. P. Griffith is now in charge and is receiving the congratulations of many friends on his promotion.

### MRS. ELIZABETH REED

The death of Mrs. Elizabeth Reed, widow of James Reed, occurred this morning at her home in Musquash. Mrs. Reed, who was in her eighty-second year, is survived by four daughters, Mrs. R. S. Bonnell of West St. John, Mrs. George Spence of Musquash, and Mrs. May and Jane, at home, and three sons, George, William and Fred, all at home.

### THE JUNIOR BAND

The new instruments recently acquired for the Junior City Band were distributed to the members on last Monday evening. The boys were delighted and were trying out the instruments assigned to them. There are thirty-five in the organization. The cornet, clarinet and other sections will be taken in charge by Bandmaster Wadlington separately and given instructions.

### FINE OF SIX

A colored man named Babbs appeared in the police court this morning to answer a charge of keeping a ferocious dog without license. Mrs. Sarah E. Hogan testified that the dog jumped at her and tore a new skirt that she valued at \$8. She said that the defendant promised to pay for the garment, but had failed to do so. Her daughter, Alice R. Hector, and Mrs. Holmes also testified, after which Magistrate Ritchie warned the defendant that he was liable to a fine of \$18, \$8 for keeping a ferocious dog and allowing it to run at large and \$8 for not having a license for it. He suggested that those interested come to some agreement over the payment for the skirt and he would allow the fine to stand. This they failed to do so a fine of \$18 was struck.

## GIRL ARRESTED ON DRUNKENNESS CHARGE

Says She Was Taken Into An Office and Forced to Drink

A young girl appeared before Magistrate Ritchie in the police court this morning charged with drunkenness. The girl's name was not given. She was charged with being drunk and being forced to drink a concoction. The request was granted.

Magistrate Ritchie spoke at some length about young girls being allowed to roam about the streets at night and said that the policemen should be given them and if they were not able to explain why they were out taken them into custody. He said that he had seen too much street walking at night and as a result many serious charges were preferred in court.

## CITY TRAFFIC CASES

A report was read against J. S. Gibson & Co. Ltd. in the police court today for having a dealer's tag on one of their delivery trucks. Mr. Gibson explained that he had written to Fredericton for a tag on May 7 and had received it only yesterday. Magistrate Ritchie accepted the excuse and said that it was regrettable that a business man should have to lose his time because of tardiness on the part of others. A charge was also made in the same report that the driver of the truck, Harold Sullivan, did not have a license. Mr. Gibson explained that the driver was not in his employ now. The magistrate said that the driver should have been summoned.

Charles Beshara was charged with driving on the wrong side of Haymarket square. A fine was struck against him but was allowed to stand.

Leonard Steves was reported for driving a delivery truck for the Two Bakers without having a license. He said he had successfully passed the required examinations but as he was not quite eighteen years of age he was unable to procure a license. He was told he would have to discontinue driving the truck until he could get the certificate.

### POLICE COURT.

A boy who escaped from the Boys' Industrial Home yesterday appeared before Magistrate Ritchie this morning. His case was set aside until the superintendent of the home could be present. Two men arrested on drunkenness charges were told that they were liable to \$200 for having liquor on them and \$8 or two months in jail for being drunk. They were sent below.

In a case before the police court yesterday it was stated that evidence was given by Mr. Kane of Kane & Ring. This was an error. Mr. Kane was not in court.

## PLANS FOR THE FRIDAY PARADE

Cadet Corps to be Out in Force.  
With Depot Battalion Band—  
Visiting Corps

The following are Cadet Corps orders issued by Lieut.-Colonel A. H. Powell, commanding Military District No. 7, Empire Day parade, Friday, May 24, 1918, 8 p.m.

The handsome cup so generously contributed by Brigadier-General A. H. Macdonell, C.M.G., D.S.O., for competition annually on Empire Day will take place on the above named date. The competition is open to all cadet corps in the Province of New Brunswick who are represented at the parade. The company winning the trophy will hold the cup for one year or until won by some other cadet corps competitor in next ensuing Empire parade.

The company or corps winning the cup at the first three parades, not necessarily consecutively, will retain the possession of the trophy on the last occasion on which it is so declared the winner.

The conditions governing the competition in addition to the foregoing, provide that the inspector of cadets or the umpire so appointed, by the donor will be present at the parade and award the trophy to the smartest, neatest, best marching and drilled company on the occasion. This includes steadiness on parade at all times, quickness of movement and strictest discipline maintained. The matter of uniformed or un-uniformed cadets will not be taken into consideration by the umpire in making his award in respect to the parade.

The parade will form up at 2.30 p.m. at King street east passing west under their respective instructors and officers in company column formation. The march-off will start punctually at 3 p.m., and proceed in column of route formation, passing through the following streets—Sydney, south side King square, Charlotte and King, returning by way of Prince William, St. James, Charlotte and King square to King street east where the parade will be dismissed. The presentation of the cup will take place at King street east immediately before dismissal.

Note—When the parade reaches the head of King street, they will form column of company formation and continue this formation until after having passed the saluting base.

The saluting base will be in front of the Royal Hotel where the Union Jack will be displayed. The whole parade will be under the immediate command of Major Magee (the senior officer instructor of cadet corps in the province), and all other cadet instructors will govern themselves accordingly; each company being in command of its respective instructor and officers.

Each cadet corps present should provide on a prominently displayed banner or flag, the name and number of its cadet corps, in centre of the company.

The following are the names of the corps who have been notified: being present at the parade—St. Andrew's Cadet Corps, High School Cadet Corps, St. Peter's Cadet Corps, St. Stephen's (Knox) Cadet Corps, St. Malachi's Cadet Corps, Winter street Cadet Corps, all of St. John; Sussex Cadet Corps, Redheugh Collegiate School Cadet Corps, Aberdeen School Cadet Corps, Moncton; King Edward Cadet Corps, St. John's High School, Fredericton, Cadet Corps, West St. John (LaTour, St. Patrick and Tower schools), Aberdeen, Central Victoria Cadet Corps, St. John's Fairville Cadet Corps.

The 1st Depot Battalion, N. B. Regiment, will lead the parade and take their position opposite the saluting base in King street at the proper time while the march past is being carried out. The Rothery Collegiate Cadet Band will take its place at the head of its company and when within the proper distance of the saluting base, stop playing until its company has passed.

It is hoped the G. W. Y. will form up as a guard of honor in King street, and be thoroughly representative so as to show their appreciation of the work carried on by the cadets of the schools.

The general officer commanding the district and staff will be present to receive the salute, and it is also expected that the mayor and prominent citizens of St. John will, by their presence and cooperation, join in the witnessing of this cadet display by the school boys.

## WORKING FOR PLAYGROUND AT ROCKWOOD FOR CHILDREN

Mayor Hayes, Commissioners Fisher and Hilyard and Engineer Hatfield held a conference this morning with Canon Armstrong, H. L. Ganter, Postmaster Sears and A. M. Biddings, representing the Rotary Club and Playgrounds Association, relative to the preparation of the Rockwood playground. It was agreed that the first step should be to provide a baseball diamond at the nearest end of the area, and Engineer Hatfield will take levels and report on what seems to be the most feasible plan of putting a section of the area in condition for play purposes. All present were heartily in favor of taking action to provide a recreation field.

## DEATH OF CAPTAIN WILLIAM LIPSETT

On the 81st anniversary of his birth, death came at 1 o'clock this morning at the Home for Invalids, to Capt. William Lipsett, an old-time master mariner who sailed the seas for more than fifty years. Captain Lipsett was removed to the home a few months ago. His wife, who since last autumn has been suffering from the effects of a severe fall, is at the home of her sister, Mrs. N. C. Scott.

Captain Lipsett was a native of Grand Lake, Queens county. For many years he sailed as captain in vessels owned by George P. Smith, Vroom & Arnold and A. W. Adams. He was a man of fine character, respected by all who knew him. His wife survives, but there are no children. The news of his death will be heard with regret by many friends of the older generation.
