SECOND DIVORCE FROM SAME WOMAN

New York, Feb. 18.—By winning two divorces from the same woman, Andrew Iron, Jr., of Stamford, has established a record. In the supreme court there he secured his second divorce from Anna Irene Iron, who had been divorced from him in 1907. He testified that he first met her in 1887. After living with her about seventeen years, he obtained a divorce on the ground of desertion. As a result of an accidental meeting with her, they were remarried. His wife again in 1907, following a quarrel with her mother, gravely injured Judge Durr. "I don't know how many times this should help you out. I advise you to try it again."

GRAND DEPUTY'S VISIT Deputy H. J. San Salvador, Republic of El Salvador, Feb. 18.—Three of the assassins of the late president of the republic of Salvador, Dr. Manuel E. Arango, were shot by platoons of soldiers in the presence of a large party of people yesterday. A council of war condemned to death seven persons who had taken an active part in the crime.

Rochester, N. Y., Feb. 18.—Seven arrests on minor charges marked a demonstration by striking garment workers yesterday afternoon in front of the shops of two independent manufacturers. Two policemen seized the strikers upon their continued refusal to discontinue their picketing and to return to work yesterday morning. The manufacturers having presented an agreement with the strikers.

CHANCERY COURT

The February sitting of the Supreme Court, Chancery Division, was held this morning with Mr. Justice McLeod presiding.

In the matter of Hester A. Freeman et al., infants, J. F. H. Teed moved for the appointment of guardians and leave to sell two lots in Charlotte county to which the infants are entitled as heirs at law. John H. O'Brien and his wife Mary, are appointed guardians of the persons, estate with power to sell the real estate at a sum not less than \$300; the proceeds to be invested in good security to the sum of \$200, costs of the application to be paid out of the estate.

In the matter of the estate of the late William Power, Fred R. Taylor moved for the appointment of the Royal Trust Company as trustees. George McSwiney and William J. Walsh, having died since the appointment of the trustees, the order was made, costs of the application to be paid out of the estate.

In the case of Smith vs. Kipparick, Rabah St. J. Freese, for the defendant, with the consent of M. G. Teed, K. C., for the plaintiff, asked to have the matter stand until March 2. Trial was fixed for that date.

The case of the Attorney-General vs. The Saint John Lumber Company and Teed vs. Canadian Coal Corporation were stood over until the next court.

In the probate court today in the matter of the estate of Captain Charles Wesley Brannen, master mariner, Rev. George F. Scovell and Frederick W. Tapley, executors, filed their accounts and asked to have them passed. A citation was issued returnable at 11 a. m. on March 25. The matter of the estate of Mrs. Anna Gibson was taken up. She died intestate, leaving as next of kin three sons, James, Robert and Charles H. Gibson, coal merchants, and Frederick H. Gibson, insurance agent, all of St. John. On the petition of the three sons Charles H. Gibson was appointed administrator. There is no real estate; personally, Barnhill, Erving & Sanford are executors.
