Malnutrition is a Serious Problem
From 20 to 83 per cent of American School Children suffer from it—The Remedy.
(United States Public Health Service.)
At least twenty and according to some estimates possibly thirty-three per cent of school children of the United States are suffering from malnutrition, as general physical underdevelopment is commonly designated, says a report that will soon be published by the U. S. Public Health Service, which co-operated in its preparation. Malnutrition, continues the report, is not confined to any one class or race; in some cities it is apparently as prevalent in the homes of the well-to-do than in those of persons of more limited means. The condition is evidenced, not only by weight and growth records, but by listlessness, lack of color, dullness, and sometimes by restlessness and irritability. It is due chiefly to physical defects, faulty habits, or environment. Of physical defects the most common are obstructions (adenoids, for instance) in the nose or throat, which interfere with breathing; and decayed teeth, which breed germs and interfere with chewing. When such defects are remedied many children will develop normally. Faulty food and health habits are also important causes of malnutrition. They include too little food, the wrong kind of food, and bad food habits, such as eating too fast, too late, or too often. Such habits can be corrected by proper exercises, which, however, should be carefully controlled as otherwise they would prove harmful. Environmental conditions, which interfere with sufficient sleep, lack of fresh air, and even constant nagging may cause underdevelopment and their correction may result in remarkable gains. Cases of malnutrition that do not yield to simple corrective measures may require prolonged medical supervision; and, in any event, preventive measures are much better than curatives ones. Health education in the schools will go a long way toward preventing malnutrition, not only in the pupils themselves but will also, if the results are

PLAN FOR WORLD PEACE.
Mrs. Huck Would Bar Trading With Countries Refusing War Referendum.
A plan to promote world peace by refusing trade concessions to those countries that do not permit a referendum on war was advocated by Mrs. Winifred Mason Huck, representative in Congress from Illinois, at a meeting of the Women's City Club, 22 Park avenue. "I intend to propose to Congress," said Mrs. Huck, "that the United States shall not declare war without an affirmative vote of the people upon any country giving its people the right of a referendum. I also shall propose that we do not give any trade or financial concessions to any country refusing its people that privilege. 'I have been told that war cannot be prevented in that way—that other countries will resent our refusal to trade with them without such a stipulation. We are in the lead today as a nation in a financial and moral way. It is the psychological time for us to provide a foundation for world peace.'"
