In the matter of product the home

market is in a better position than

any other. He then went on to speak

of the value of the dairy products

to the economy of the farmer for cattle

and sheep. The corn crop should be

grown to near maturity. The farmer

should be able to produce more than

double the profit from his cattle. He

stated that in Quebec the yield of

cheese in 1888 was 78 pounds per

head, in '90 it had reached 100 pounds

per head, and in '91 it had reached 110

pounds per head. Most farmers in New

Brunswick could not produce more than

50 pounds per head. The increase in

the former was due to the fact that

the farmer in a season had been

increased from 50 to 100 pounds per
