The removal of the parts used for the manufacture of insulin is an apsive and the fish are taken in myriads with hook and line. The oil of tiles, &c., &c., while dogfish meal is excellent feeding for live stock and poultry and during the past summer, sold to the U.S. wholesale trade at

from \$60 to \$75 per ton. We, here in Newfoundland, are oftten pestered with these fish which were believed to be worthless from the commercial standpoint and it would indeed be a boon to the Colony if, when they make their appearance, they could be turned to profitable account.-Trade Review.
