Mrs. Thomas stated that the goods were composed of ladies' and gentlemen's wares. She purchased them from Hattle & LaHood, who keep a store on Brussels street. The goods cost her \$208.50. This was a wholesale price.

During her cross-examination, Mrs. Thomas stated that she was going to sell the goods to a man for \$260. She had stated a few minutes before that she was going to peddle the goods. When asked why she did not go to McAdam on the C. P. R. traft the day she checked the bundles, Mrs. Thomas said that she did not wish to arrive there until the fifteenth of the month, so she thought she would peddle along the shore for a few days.

Mrs. McLean asked the plaintiff if a C. P. R. detective had talked to her about the matter at McAdam. The witness stated that some man had asked her questions, but she didn't know who he was. No doubt this is the nicest of the prevailing Furs.

MEN ARE SCARCE FOR U. S. ARMY

Almost Impossible to **Enough Recruits.**

Officers Ordered to Use Every Effort in Filling the Vacancies and in

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—Not in recent years, except in war times, has the United States army been so badly in need of men as at present. A recent circular address to all officers of the recruiting service calls attention to the fact that recruits are needed in large numbers for the coast artillery, the field artillery, the white infantry and the white cavalry and recruiting officers are enjoined to redouble their efforts. Officers on duty at the war department admit that the situation is one calling for the most extraordinary efforts to get more men, not only to fill the vacancies that now exist, but also those which will occur during the present year among the three year men who enlisted in 1904.
