

S., Jan 25.—So quiet have matters been in connection with civic affairs that there were doubts in the minds of many up to this afternoon if there would even be a contest, but at 5 o'clock, the hour when nomination closed, it was found that 11 men were in the field to fill four seats. The vacancies to be filled at the board are to replace the following whose term of office expires. Mayor Robb, Councillors Stewart Jenks, John A. Crossman and Charles T. Hillson.

The candidates nominated were for mayor, ex-Mayor Thomas P. Lowther, and retiring councillors, John A. Crossman, and for councillors three different tickets, one of which has been designated as the citizens' ticket, composed of Arthur W. Moffat, George W. Cole and David L. Smith. The Labor party nominated John Ball, Howard Ripley and James Duxbury, while an Independent ticket is composed of H. R. McCulley, D. D. S., Stephen Coates and Dennis Collins.

Mr. Lowther has occupied the mayor's chair twice, in 1905 and 1907, and was defeated in 1906 and 1908. Mr. Crossman has been councillor for two years. Mr. Moffat has served at the board several terms since incorporation. The others are all new men in civic affairs. As polling takes place one week from today the intervening time promises to be lively.

CONVICT'S DEPOSIT GOES TO CREDITORS

Sum of \$1,666 Deposited by Will Divided Among Six

FREDERICTON, N. B., Jan. 26.—The matter of the sum of \$1,666 deposited by draft in the Bank of Nova Scotia during the month of January, 1907, by a man who signed himself Oscar Wilde, Chilef Justice Barker in equity court this afternoon ordered that the money be divided among six banks in Washington state, all creditors of Wilde. At the time Wilde deposited the money he was a fugitive from justice, having swindled banks in Washington by means of bogus securities. For this offense he is still serving in state penitentiary. A. J. Gregcry, H. A. Powell, J. H. Barry and J. J. F. Winslow argued the case on behalf of the Washington banks. There were really eight claimants for the money, but only six were considered by the court.
