Both the old and new seats were well occupied, and the police report that there was excellent conduct throughout.

Noakes Taken To Reformatory Yesterday. Harry Noakes, the truant, who was unable to be taken to the reformatory, was located yesterday morning and escorted to the institution by Officer Ira Perry. He will have to serve a twelve month term, having been sentenced for truancy by Judge Forbes.

Married Last Evening. A pretty wedding took place last evening at the new home of the bride and groom, 50 Metcalf street, when Rev. R. P. McKim, of St. Luke's church, united Mr. Edward G. Brittain and Miss Frederica Clark. Mr. Brittain came to Canada from England and Miss Clark was a native of Newfoundland. The bride wore white silk and carried a bouquet of white carnations.

Old Tree Cut Down. A large tree near the centre path of the King Square which has stood for many years, and which has been rendered useless by its decadence, and only tended to detract from the appearance of the square. Several other trees in the old building ground have been hewed down. Some of them were dangerous; others were decayed and useless.

Thrown To The Ground. Miss Bessie Farris, of Brook street, was thrown to the street while alighting from a street car at Simonds St., last evening, and was very severely bruised.

She said last evening that the accident was due to the carelessness of the conductor of the car, who ran ahead before she had time to alight, and that she contemplated taking action against the street railway.

Officiated at Funeral. Rev. A. W. Smithers passed through the city last evening on route to Fredericton from Waterford, where he officiated yesterday afternoon, at the funeral of Mr. Richard Bell, one of the oldest members of the Church of England in the province. Mr. Bell was 88 years of age. His death took place at Lakeside. The deceased is survived by two sons and three daughters, all of whom reside at Sussex. They are Mr. Thomas Bell, Mr. Andrew Bell, Mrs. Wm. J. Patterson, Mrs. James Patterson, and Mrs. Samuel McAfee.

Died Last Evening. The death of Mrs. William Murray, of Lower Millstream, Kings Co., took place at seven o'clock last evening, at her home. The deceased had been ill with inflammatory rheumatism for eight years and her death was not unexpected. She is survived by her husband. She was seventy-five years of age.

The late Mrs. Murray and her husband were active workers in the United Baptist church at Lower Millstream and were formerly members of the Brunswick street church of this city. They left St. John about sixteen years ago and took up their residence at Lower Millstream where they since led a retired life. The deceased was most highly esteemed in the community in which she lived.

The funeral will take place on Friday at 12.30 p. m. from her late residence. Interment will be made at Sussex cemetery at 2.30.

YOUTH STOLE FROM SAFE OF MR. GORHAM

A bold Indiantown youngster was caught yesterday afternoon in the act of helping himself to the contents of the safe in Mr. George Gorham's store on Bridge street. Mr. Stubbs laid a complaint at the North End Police Station last evening and intends to take action in the matter.

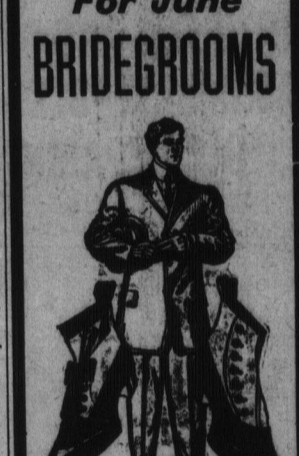
