STANTON AND STONE ON TRIAL

**Defence Seeks to Prove Alibi
in Stone's Case — Burdock
Bursts on Coat Feature of
Evidence.**

The trial of Harry Stone and George
Stanton for breaking and entering
Messrs. Emerson and Fisher's store on
Tuesday, Jan. 24th last, was com-
menced in the county court yesterday
morning at 10 o'clock, before Judge
Forbes and the following jury: Har-
ry C. Green, Charles G. Hoyt, James
C. Quinn, Justus G. Lake, A. Gordon
Flummer, James F. McDonald, Her-
bert S. Francis, H. S. McLaughlin,
Harry F. Floyd, E. B. Johnston, Syd-
ney Gibbs.

C. J. Coster, K. C., appeared for the
Crown; J. B. M. Baxter, K. C. and
G. Earle Logan for Stanton and H. B.
Ritchie for Stanton.

Patrick Ferris, an employee of Em-
erson and Fisher's, was the first wit-
ness. He told of finding the door of
the cellar open the morning after the
break and of goods scattered over the
shop floor.

H. Walter Emerson, Hugh Har-
grave, R. B. Emerson, Allen Con-
nell, James Farish, Samuel Stone,
Joseph Daley and Anthony Howe gave
evidence similar to that given at the
preliminary examination. Messrs. Em-
erson and McConnell identified the
razors and knives. Farish and Stone
told about receiving several razors
and knives from Stone; Daley and
Howe told about seeing Stone around
on the day of the robbery.

Afternoon Session.
When the court resumed Mary Lee,
of Sheffield street, was the first wit-
ness. She told of seeing Stone bring
his house late on the night of the
robbery and giving her three razors
and one knife.

Joseph London told of being pre-
sented with a razor by Stanton. His
witness was stood aside and Michael
Lauer an Assyrin, to whom Lon-
don sold the razor in question, next
testified.

Mrs. Sarah Morris, who purchased
a knife from Farish, the latter hav-
ing received it from Stone and Geo.
Stanton, who told about Stone and
Stanton being in his place on the
night of the robbery, were witnesses.
Detective Killen testified as to the
arrest of both Stone and Stanton and
identified a number of knives and raz-
ors.

He told of visiting Sheffield street
to recover the lost property, and later
meeting Stone. The latter told him he
received the goods which he had
given away in Sheffield street from
Stanton, and later when some more
property was found on Stone he said
he had received it from his cousin,
Samuel Stone. When Stanton was
arrested he denied having given any
goods to Stone.

On cross-examination by Mr. Logan
the witness stated that the goods
Stanton gave up to him were not done
up in a parcel. He could not remem-
ber just what language Stanton had
been using in denying that he had given
the articles to Stone.

Mr. Ritchie, for exact language
in order to be fair to both prisoners,
the witness replied:

"That's what bothers me." (Laugh-
ter).

His Honor—There are far too many
persons in this court for the interest
which attaches to the case. You
would far better be away attending
to your own business instead of loaf-
ing in a criminal court, but as long

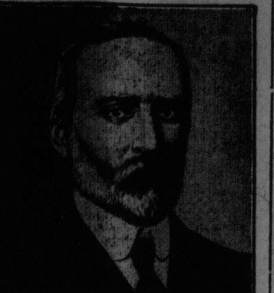

as you are here you will have to be-
have yourselves. If there is any more
laughing I will clear the court.

Joseph London, who had been stood
aside earlier in the proceedings, again
took the stand and identified a razor
guard as similar to one he had refer-
red to. He created some amusement
by professing ignorance as to its pur-
pose.

To Mr. Ritchie witness told of be-
ing with Stanton when the latter pur-
chased a razor stop, shaving mug
and pair of shoes in a shop on Mill
street. He could not identify the
razor as one produced in court.

His Note Book.

Deputy Chief F. W. Jenkins was
next called and corroborated the evi-
dence by Detective Killen regarding
the arrest of the two prisoners and
their statements when arrested. To
refresh his memory he referred to his
note book, in which he had made a
record of the conversation. This was
to the effect that Stanton denied ac-
cusingly having given to Stone the
articles the latter said he had received
from Stanton.

Mr. Ritchie displayed some curi-
osity regarding the memorandum
which the Deputy had made and asked
to see it.

His Honor—"If it is given to you
Mr. Crown will have the right to place
it in evidence."

Mr. Ritchie—"Then I will not ask
for it."

On cross-examination by Mr. Logan
Stanton described the picket fence
which surrounds the rear of Emerson
& Fisher's premises, and said that
anybody, even an intoxicated person,
would have absolutely no difficulty
in passing the fence.

He would not say whether a person could walk through
Mr. R. A.'s alley into the field where
the burdocks were without climbing
a fence. After some further question-
ing the witness stated that the chief
reason he had for declaring that the
burglars had entered from the vacant
lot was the fact that burrds were
found on Stone's coat.

Mr. Crown never went into or
vacant lots with burdocks in them in
St. John."

This concluded the evidence for the
crown.

Ritchie—"If the crown is
through with evidence I would ask
to have Stanton discharged for lack
of evidence."

His Honor—"My goodness, no.
There is clear evidence here. The
jury must take the evidence as they
see it."

Mr. Baxter then addressed the jury.
First taking up the indictment against
Stone and the meaning of the charge
breaking and entering the defence
was produced to connect him with
the actual crime and it could be
shown that these were found in the
vacant lots which the prisoners had
entered when running away from
Stanton's wife. It was shown by
the evidence that Ferris was in the
store until 6:45 when he locked up
and that Mr. Emerson had entered the
place again at 8:15 when he felt the
draught and found a door open. This
then was the time when the entry
was made and the defence could show
that Stone was in his own home at
that time.

John Kenney, Jr., factory inspector
for New Brunswick, was next called
and testified to the presence of bur-
dock bushes on vacant lot on the
corner of Gorman and Harding street.
If anyone took refuge there after dark
he might get pretty well covered with
"stickers."

Fred Stone, brother of the prisoner,
was then called. He testified that his
mother had been confined to the house
for two years with heart trouble.
She could not come to court or stand
the excitement of a visit by the jury.
The night before the burglary his
brother Harry had worked at longshore
work, his usual work. On the day of
the burglary William and other mem-
bers of the family had supper about
six o'clock. Harry came in later and
had his supper. He was noticeably
under the influence of liquor. He did
not leave again until nearly 7:30 o'clock.
Witness knew of his mother giving
prisoner some money before he
went out, from fifty cents to a dollar
in silver.

Witness knew of the lot on Gorman
street, and knew that it contained
burdocks. On the evening of the bur-
glary he had moved his brother's coat
before he went out and knew that

was the father. She was released

save her father from disgrace. Her
husband is still in prison for his share
in the crime.

DEFER INCREASE IN MAGAZINE POSTAGE

Washington, March 2.—The pro-
posed increase of magazine postage
is dead for this session. Chairman
Pecora announced on the Senate
floor today that in view of the cer-
tainty that the debate on the subject
would obstruct other legislation and
that in any case, he would ask the
Senate to agree to abandon the propo-
sition.
