Considerable Business Transacted by the New Brunswick Association in Session at Hartland, Yesterday.

Hartland, N. B., July 14.—The association met this morning for the last day's work, with a large attendance and much interest. The corresponding secretary's report was read and the ordination of two candidates to the ministry was decided on.

Rev. Dr. Phillips, assistant moderator, presided at the business session after devotional exercises led by Rev. W. H. Jenkins, of Gibson.

Rev. Everett Johnson, colored, of Ottnabog, on being called on, briefly addressed the association on his work among the colored people of Queens and York counties.

A letter was received from Rev. Mr. Lennox, stating that he had withdrawn from the Baptist denomination and united with the Presbyterian, which had been his original church.

Rev. J. B. Belyea, for the committee on ordination, reported that Mr. J. P. Crabtree take a course of study and be granted an association license; that the ordination of Mr. S. Johnson be delayed four months and that the church be called by the Muskegon church for a minister.

Mr. D. C. Clark and Rev. F. E. Bishop to represent this association; that a committee be appointed to draw up a standard of education for candidates in this association; that Mr. J. A. Corey be ordained.

The emining committee was enlarged by the addition of Revs. H. Saunders and T. D. Bell to former ex-aminee Mr. S. Johnson for ordination. The report of the committee on the secretary, reported that there were 294 churches enrolled; 229 reported; 219 had pastors; there were 765 baptisms; 166 churches contributed to the fund; 153 churches reported; 293 church edifices; 32 parsonages; 114 churches reported. The value of church property is \$876, 688. The amount raised for pastors' salaries was \$60,457; local expenditures, \$72,154; denominational work, \$15,533. The total amount raised was \$148,144. Most of the offerings were less than last year, with the notable exception of pastors' salaries, in which

The morning meeting conducted at 10:30 o'clock and Rev. Walker delivered the address at meeting.

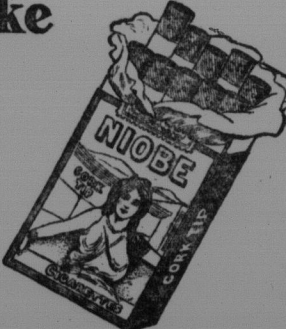
At half past one the services resumed with a children's meeting. Miss Slipp gave an interesting instructive address.
