JEWELS, FURS AND SILVER POINT NEED OF HIGH MORE COMMISSION WORK TAKEN BY BOLD BURGLARS

Residence of E. Ross Fenwick, 83 Summer Street, Entered Sometime Monday Night—Thief Made Careful Search and Took Only Valuable Goods.

Probably one of the most successful robberies, from the standpoint of money stolen, that has occurred in the city for some time, was brought to the attention of the police at an early hour yesterday morning, when it was discovered that the residence of E. Ross Fenwick, manager of the Dunlop Tire and Rubber Goods Co., at 83 Summer street, had been broken into during Monday evening and that valuable furs, jewelry and other expensive articles had been removed.
