JULY SESSION OF  
ALBERT COUNTY COUNCIL  
HELD ON TUESDAY

**Parish of Covendale Refuses Responsibility for an Inmate at Provincial Hospital and Charged to the Parish.**

Albert, N. B., July 6.—The July session of the Albert County Council was held at the court house at Hopewell Cape today. Councillors Rommel and Cleveland from Alma, Ryan and Smith from Covendale, Goggin and Kilman from Elgin, Stevens and Thompson from Hillsborough, Milton from Harvey, and Fye from Hopewell were in attendance. Councillors Carnwath of Hopewell and Lunn of Harvey were absent.

The session convened at 10 a. m. Warden Ryan in the chair. Committees all stand as named at annual session. A petition from School District No. 7, Covendale, asking that said district be made a pound district was read and on motion the request was granted.

The secretary-treasurer read a communication from Judge Jones ordering the council to pay the sum of seventy-five dollars towards the support of the thirteen year old delinquent girl from this county, now at the girls' home at Truro, sentenced to three years' imprisonment by the judge in April last. On motion appropriation was made as ordered.

A communication was read from James Brydon, manager of the branch of the Bank of Nova Scotia at Riverside, asking for a readjustment of the rate of interest and discount relating to the county account—altering it from 3 1/2 p. c. to 6 p. c. on overdrafts, and credit balances draw only 2 instead of 3 1/2 p. c. as at present. On motion the following were named a committee to make the best possible banking arrangements wherever possible: Councillors Cleveland and Thompson and the secretary-treasurer. On motion ordered that two items—\$50 and \$15.75 be credited to Parish of Elgin to settle the rate of interest account to end of the year for dinner resuming after dinner.

Finance committee's report read and adopted, and several bills were ordered paid.

Moved by Coun. Smith, seconded by Coun. Ryan that the superintendent of the Provincial Hospital be notified that the man, Edwards, an inmate charged to Covendale, is not a resident of that parish and no responsibility will be assumed by said parish on his behalf, also that Wm. H. Scott, an inmate from said parish, has ample property for his maintenance, and the parish declines to be burdened with the charge. On motion the committee on county property is ordered to have the court house painted, chimneys and tank repaired, and a telephone replaced in the court house as formerly.

Council adjourned at 5 p. m. after the shortest session on record.
