## WILL ASK STREET RAILWAY TO GRANT SPECIAL WORKMEN'S TICKETS AT REDUCED RATES

Commissioner Wigmore Brings Matter to the Attention of the Council and Common Clerk Instructed to Send Request for Such Action—Salvation Army Grants Will Come Up on Thursday.

It was decided at yesterday's meeting of the common council to ask the New Brunswick Power Company, the new owners of the street railway, to issue workmen's tickets at a reduced rate for certain hours of the day. Commissioner Wigmore was the father of the movement and in proposing such action stated that this practice obtained in practically every city where street cars ran, and he felt it would be a good time for St. John to get in line. The new owners seemed to be disposed to treat the people fairly and he had no doubt that if the matter was brought to their attention some action along these lines would be taken. The other commissioners favored the stand taken by Commissioner Wigmore and the motion to request the company to grant this concession to the laboring men of the city was carried unanimously. Commissioner Fisher brought up the garage by-law and suggested that it be repealed.

Representatives of the Salvation Army were present under the impression that the matter of grants to them was to come up, but this was deferred until Thursday. It was decided to go back to the hour of 11:30 a. m. for the committee meeting, as 4:30 had proved somewhat inconvenient. All the commissioners were present when the mayor called the meeting to order at 4:30. Commissioner Wigmore moved that as representatives of the Salvation Army were present they be heard. Commissioner McLellan objected as the county secretary had not been notified to be present with correspondence in connection with the material hospital matter. Staff Captain Turner said they had nothing to say. They had come to listen to the charges of Commissioner McLellan and reply to them. Commissioner McLellan replied that he had not made any charges but before any action in the matter was taken he wanted the correspondence between the hospital commissioners and the army at hand. It was decided to take up the matter at the Thursday meeting and Commissioner McLellan moved that the hospital commissioners be asked to attend.

**LOOK FOR EARLY OPENING OF THE SAWMILL SEASON**  
Number of Lumbermen Here Yesterday—Mr. Cowles Inspecting Peijpscot Plant at Great Salmon River.

A large number of North Shore and American lumbermen were in the city yesterday. They report that the prospects are bright for the early opening of the saw mill season. There is an unusual demand for lumber in the American market and high prices prevail. On many of the streams driving operations will be commenced early next month. Among those who came to St. John on business were J. A. B. Cowles and party of New York. Mr. Cowles is the head of the Peijpscot Lumber Company, which has a mill and extensive interests at Great Salmon River. Mr. Cowles went out to his mill Saturday on an inspection tour. He is well pleased with the extensive improvement which have been made at the mill. Mr. Cowles and party, including the company's engineer, G. Drew, of Brunswick, Maine, left last evening on the Boston train for their homes.

On motion of Commissioner Fisher it was decided to hold the committee meetings at 11:30 a. m., instead of 4:30 p. m., as the latter hour was not a convenient one. He also brought up a request from Robertson, Foster and Smith, for permission to build a vault under the sidewalk on Mill street. No action was taken and the matter will be dealt with at the council today, but the feelings of the council seemed to be in favor of granting the request. He brought up the matter of granting a permit to George Carvell to build a garage on Cliff street. He has been talking with the city solicitor on the question and the solicitor had told him that his opinion rendered last October still held. The commissioner suggested that the by-law be repealed and the council rely on the power it possessed under the law regulating offensive occupation to deal with these matters.

Commissioner McLellan thought it was a rather peculiar admission for the commissioner to make that the matter would be better in the hands of council than of the churches, and said that if they repealed the by-law and dealt with each case as it came up they would be accused of favoritism no matter how they acted. The mayor asked what authority the city had under the law regarding dangerous buildings and was informed that it was a somewhat lengthy process to get a building destroyed under the present law as the matter had to be taken first to a judge of the circuit court, then dealt with by the grand jury, then after thirty days the building could be torn down. Commissioner McLellan moved that the common clerk be instructed to communicate with the New Brunswick Power Company and ask them to issue workmen's tickets at a reduced rate good for certain hours of the day.

The mayor announced that the city had at the present time over \$140,000 cash in the sinking fund and expected to have enough to meet the \$165,000 of bonds which matured this year. They had also subscribed for \$50,000 of the war loan for the sinking fund.

## A VAST NEW TRAGEDY NARROWLY AVERTED IN AFFLICTED BELGIUM.

Montreal, March 26.—The alarming discovery was recently made by the Central Belgian Relief Commission that the half million rationals on which they were feeding the destitute Belgians threatened to wipe out the whole of the younger generation in that unhappy country.  
The story is told by Mr. Hoover, the chairman of the commission. "All the food coming to hand did not permit the Relief Commission to give the thousands upon thousands of starving Belgians more than half the normal ration every day. At first all shared alike, adults and children. But to our alarm we soon found that while adults could stand this fairly well it was having a startling effect upon the children."

"It was proved by sad experience of a vast scale that adolescent children cannot live upon the half supply which will maintain an adult in reasonable health. This may have been known academically before, but it had never been proved on a vast scale. At this moment we have on our hands 1,250,000 children to whom we must give an extra meal a day if we are to avert a great tragedy."
