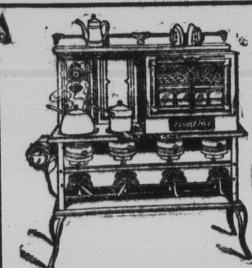

GALLANT ROUMANIAN ARMY COMPELS GERMAN FORCES TO RETIRE IN DISORDER

(Continued from page 1)

Petrograd, July 27.—Russian cavalry
threw back the pressing Austro-Ger-
man infantry on Wednesday in the
region southwest of Monastyrzaka.
In Eastern Galicia, says the official
statement issued today by the Russian
war office.

The Russian announcement says the
Roumanians have advanced to-
wards the upper reaches of the Such-
iza river, and are consolidating their
gains. The Roumanians took many
prisoners and captured six guns.

Between the Dniester river and the
Carpathians, the statement says, the
Russians continue to retire in an east-
erly direction.

Southeast of Trembowla, in Galicia,
near the Russian border, the Russians
retired a short distance to new posi-
tions. The Austro-Germans have oc-
cupied the Galician towns of Plotyev
and Czystylow, on the Sereth river.

The text of the Russian statement
reads:

Enemy Takes Two Towns.

"Western (Russian) front: North of
the Pripiet river there have been
fugitives, particularly animated be-
tween Smorgon and Krevo. North of
Tarnopol, the enemy has occupied
Plotyev and Czystylow, on the Sereth.
"His attacks southeast of Tarnopol,
on the Liozova-Smykovec front, have

been repulsed. Southeast of Trem-
bowla, our troops retired a short dis-
tance eastward to new positions.
Enemy attacks in the region of Tu-
dov, to the north of Gorlikov, were
repulsed by us.

"On Wednesday our cavalry had a
series of successful engagements in
the region of Korosniatin and Komar-
ohka, to the southwest of Monas-
teryzka, in which the enemy infantry
which was passing them, was thrown
back in a northwesterly direction. In
the course of these cavalry attacks
Col. Khesagoroff, the gallant com-
mander of the Oestinsky regiment,
was killed.

Roumanians Advance.

"Between the Dniester and the Car-
pathians our troops continue to retire
to the eastward.

"Roumanian front: The Roumanian
troops advanced toward the upper
reaches of the River Suchiza, and are
consolidating their positions. Ad-
vanced detachments moved forward
upon the heights to the west of
Sovola, and took many prisoners.

"In the course of the fighting yester-
day the Roumanians captured many
prisoners. They also took six guns,
three machine guns, three mine
throwers and a large quantity of
stores and military material.

"Caucasus front: There was no
change in the situation."

WILL VOTE ON PROHIBITION FOR THE U. S.

Senate at Washington Will

Pass on Question Next Wed-

nesday by Agreement.

Washington, July 27.—National pro-

hibition will be voted on by the Senate

next Wednesday. By unanimous con-

sent it was agreed to take up Monday

Senator Sheppard's resolution for a

national prohibition amendment to the

constitution and to dispose of it by

Wednesday night.

Foes of prohibition consented to the

vote in order to clear the resolution

from the calendar. It is to be taken

to the house and perhaps still further agi-

tation on the subject from Congress to

the states. The agreement, however,

provides, however, for addition of a pro-

viso requiring the states to act within

six years on the constitutional amend-

ment, if submitted to them.
