**FARMER BAYONETTED
IN REPRISALS FOR
ATTACK ON POLICE****Much Incendiaries in Ireland
Last Night — Policeman
Shot at Castle Island**

Tralee, Ireland, Nov. 11.—Frank Homan, a farmer, reported to be a Sinn Féin propagandist, was stopped near his home last evening by uniformed men who asked him to come to the police station. He refused and was bayoneted and shot him dead.

Several farm houses and corn stacks in a wide area were set on fire last night in reprisals for the shooting of two policemen at Tralee.

Constable Giffen was dangerously wounded last evening at Castle Island. A licensed house was set on fire but the police and military assisted in extinguishing the flames.

Soldiers in Barracks

London, Nov. 11.—In Dublin, today, there was no public celebration of Armistice Day, according to a Central News dispatch from Dublin. The military and the police, however, observed the anniversary inside the barracks by parades and the playing of the Dead March and the National Anthem.

Attacked by Nationalists.

Dublin, Nov. 11.—A party of shipyard workers, with the Union Jack at their head, returning to work from an Armistice Day celebration at the City Hall, were attacked by a crowd of Nationalists from the North Queens street area. Prompt police intervention quelled the disturbance, but not before one girl had been shot in the hand and another injured on the head by a stone.

**FOURTEEN FREE, FOUR
FINED FOR ATTEMPT
TO LYNCH MENEAL****Crown Admitted it Had Little
Evidence Against Those
Who Were Discharged.**

Welland, Ont., Nov. 11.—Dramatically and unexpectedly the end to the preliminary hearing in the case of eighteen persons charged with having been implicated in the partial destruction by fire of the Town Hall in the village of Thorold on the night of August 12 last, and in the attempt made to lynch the Methodist minister, the murder of little Margaret, each, came this afternoon at the preliminary hearing before Magistrate Fraser, of Niagara Falls, Ont.

Four of the eighteen pleaded guilty to having been members of an unlawful assembly on the occasion, and were each fined \$100, with the alternative of three months' imprisonment. The others were discharged. The charges against the twelve, charged with rioting, fourteen of them, were discharged by the magistrate, upon the recommendation of Crown Prosecutor Jeffery, on the ground that there was lack of incriminating evidence against them.

**WINNIPEG RAILROAD
WORKERS WILL FIGHT
THE HANNA ORDER****Convention to Meet in a Few
Days to Decide on Course
of Action.**

Winnipeg, Man., Nov. 11.—A convention of representatives of all labor organizations connected with the Canadian National and the Grand Trunk Pacific Railways in Winnipeg, will take place here in the course of the next few days. This is the first action to be taken as the result of the dismissal of A. H. Hanna, M.A., for Springfield, by the Canadian National Railway Company in accordance with the recent political order issued by the president, D. B. Hanna. At this convention a plan of action will be outlined and the question taken up whether or larger convention, including points outside Winnipeg will be needed.

**EXPULSED MEMBER FOR
DISLOYAL SPEECHES**

Melbourne, Australia, Nov. 11.—Mr. Mason, labor member of the House of Representatives and former prime minister of Australia, has been expelled from the House of Commons for the premier, who charged disloyal utterances at a demonstration in behalf of the Lord Mayor Macswiney of Cork. The vote was 54 to 11.

STAY AROUND THE

Montreal, Nov. 11.—There was no change in refined prices for sugar today, although it was freely predicted that the Dominion Sugar Company would soon be selling at 12 cents, less 5 per cent, or 11.40 net.

A feature of interest tomorrow will be the appearance of a half page advertisement from the Acadia House Biscuits of Montreal and Halifax, warning consumers that the price of sugar to them on Friday, November 13, will be 15 cents, and that in the interim, after that date notification through the public press will be given of what the price of sugar to the consumer who buys from grocers obtaining their supplies through this refinery should be.
