Business Briefs

MacDonald's Restaurants of Ontario Limited executives and Mississauga Mayor Robert Speck are happy about the proposed construction of a company restaurant in the town.

"I'm more than pleased about it," the mayor told council's general committee, Wednesday.

'We have been dying to get into Mississauga," Mr. Ronald Coagn, vice-president, real estate with Mac-Donald's told The News, Friday.

"We have been negotiating for a site in Mississauga for a year and a half

"Mississauga is a big place and we should have more than one restaurant there.'

Mr. Coagn said the company considered the Hurontario St. site, near the South Service Rd., to be "de-

The restaurant is expected to be a 70- or 90-seater and would be open from 11 a.m. to 11 p.m. or mid-

The site is the former Belford property where the Bare Naked store now stands.

DEVELOPMENT PERMITS

Permits for seven new industrial buildings were issued in November by Mississauga Building Department, the department announced last week.

Biggest went to Tormal Development Ltd., whose \$145,000 permit allows for the construction of a 23,300-square-foot masonry building on Ambler Dr.

A \$ 40,000 permit went to Saracini Investment Ltd. for a 20,400-square-foot building on Dorman Rd.

Other permits issued went to: M and T. De Man (\$12,000) for a 2,100-square-foot building on Dun-das St., E.; Boreal Biological Laboratories Ltd. (\$22,700), for a 4,255-square-foot building on Mattawa Ave.; Richill Construction (\$50,000), for a 10,077-sq-ft. building on Crestlawn Ave.; Nadas Engineering Ltd. (\$5,000), for a 2,500-sq-ft. steel building on Mavis Rd. and the Canadian National Railway Company (\$3,000) for a frame building of 800sq.-ft. on Airport Rd.

The seven new industrial buildings bring the total so far this year to 56, as against 80 for the same period last year.

PERMITS DOWN - VALUES UP

Despite a more than 800 drop in the issuance of new building permits up to the end of November this year, total permit values have jumped by \$5 1/2 million, according to figures released last week by Mississauga building department

So far this year the department has issued 1,964 new permits, compared with 2,779 for the same period

Total permit value has, however, jumped from the 1969 figure of \$101,364,876 to \$106,820,989. Town and governmental building projects accounted for the sizeable increase in value.

Permits for \$5,526,000 were issued last month for governmental projects, bringing the total for the year so far to \$17,140,554. Town projects have so far accounted for a total of \$2,107,000 compared with a total for the same period a year earlier of \$174,000.

While the total value of industrial permits are up almost \$3 million, totals for residential, commercial and school developments are down.

Church building permits so far this year are \$325,000 up on 1969 at \$724,900.

Permits have so far been issued for 3,816 new dwellings, compared to 3,822 in 1969; 56 new industrial buildings, compared to 80 in 1969; and 31 commer-cial buildings, compared to 37.

Residential building permits total \$46,888,331 as against a total for the 1969 period of \$55,178,519. Commercial permits total \$13,749,419, compared to \$17,436,592. School permits total \$9,486,750 compared to \$9,867,600.
