My dear Sir Andrew:

You may recall mentioning that you thought of having printed the speech which you made before the Canadian Club of Ottawa on Saturday of last week, and that you would be glad to have copies made available for distribution. If you have any thought of the kind in mind, I would like to say that Mr. Fisher, Mr. Fielding, and Mr. Murphy, who also were present at the luncheon, agree with me that a wide circulation of the address would be wholly in the national interest. As a political organization, it would perhaps be unwise for the Liberals to undertake the publication of the pamphlet, even were we in a position to do so, and you were wholly agreeable to the idea. Just at present, such funds as we have available for distribution of party literature are more than required for meeting obligations already assumed. We have, however, in the National Liberal Organization Committee, a splendid agency for the distribution of literature of the kind, and should you care to have the Committee supplied with copies of the address, we would be glad indeed to arrange for its distribution just as widely as the copies you might feel prepared to place at our disposal would permit.

I hope I am not presuming in suggesting that you consider permitting your address to be used in this manner as part of the educational propaganda of an enlightened Liberalism. If, however, you share that
