He adds, however, that a considerable proportion of the boys who attend the School should learn trades, Blacksmithing and Carpentry especially; that weakly or delicate boys might be taught Tailoring, Harness-making, and working otherwise in leather too perhaps. The Superintendent General is of opinion that some steps should be taken ere long to train Indian girls to various industries, who might intermarry with the trained Indian youths, who otherwise will find wives among the uneducated women of their Bands and relapse into barbarism.
