permits may be issued at once to members of the band to cut such limited quantities as may be considered advisable, but the total quantity should not be exceeded.

In order to prevent the cutting of more than is authorized, you should restrict each permit holder to a specific number of logs.

easily calculate the number of permits you should issue in order to carry out the intention of the Department.

If any Indian cuts a greater number than the permit stipulates, he will have to pay double dues on the surplus.

No white labour, men or teams, will be allowed to work, and Indians who have no teams or outfit should work not for those who have, as they should be given permits, being incapable of hauling any timber they might cut.

The logs must be delivered at convenient points for shipment, not left on tops of hills, or placed at such a distance from the water as to necessitate cost and expense to the purchaser in watering them.

You should give personal and close attention to the operations and the Forest Bailiff should visit the works frequently and should assign limits to each permit holder, as described, and should see that promiscuous outting is not done by any Indian.

The purchaser will retain from the Indians dues as per tariff and double dues in cases where the number of logs is exceeded.
