BURFORD, ONT.—Allan Muir intends building a brick bank.

CLINTON, ONT. — J. T. Tisdale purposes building a red brick block.

ALEXANDRIA, ONT.—A. L. Smith wants tenders by 15th inst. for \$3,644 local improvement debentures of the town.

MARMORA, ONT.—The foundation is being put in for a new Catholic church here.

UXBRIDGE, ONT. — The Grand Trunk Railway have decided to build a new station here.

ST. MARY'S, ONT.—A new station will likely be built here by the Grand Trunk Railway.

GALT, ONT.—Plans are being prepared for a new collegiate institute building to cost \$30,000.

EXETER, ONT.—S. Rowe has purchased property on which to erect a brick dwelling next spring.

BILLINGS BRIDGE, ONT. — A. Bell, architect, is preparing plans for a vault in the township hall.

FORT FRANCES, ONT.—Tenders have just been taken by C. J. Holland for erection of Anglican church.

RENFREW, ONT.—Bids received by J. K. Rochester, clerk, up to 23rd inst. for \$3,058.73 town debentures.

GRAVENHURST, ONT.—A by-law was carried here on Monday last to assist Digby Grimston in establishing a factory.

NUTANA, N.W.T. — William Bate will receive bids for \$14,000 of debentures, issued for erection of brick school buildings.

SARNIA, ONT.—The Salvation Army will build a new barracks on Front street south, for which plans are now being prepared.

HULL, QUE.—A movement is on foot to purchase the balance of the Brewery Creek power for waterworks improvements.

ATHENS, ONT.—A. Green, of Oak Leaf, has purchased the D. Chamberlain homestead here and will erect a fine residence for himself.

POINTE AUX TREMBLES, QUE.—The French Evangelization Board intend enlarging the school here to accommodate 250 more pupils.

LACHINE, QUE.—The ratepayers have decided to borrow \$15,000 to improve the waterworks system. Two electric pumps will be installed.

TORONTO JUNCTION, ONT.—A local builder is negotiating with a Toronto law firm for the erection of fifty dwelling houses in the east end of the city.

OSHAWA, ONT.—The council have decided to take immediate steps towards

the construction of a waterworks system. R. E. Speakman, C.E., will give expert advice.

KINGSTON, ONT.—Power & Son, architects, have this week taken tenders on erection of machine and blacksmith shop for the Montreal Transportation Company.

LUNENBURG, N.S.—J. M. Anderson will receive tenders up to 20th inst. for repairing and enlarging the Sunday School building of St. John's Anglican church.

BROCKVILLE, ONT.—On November 2nd the ratepayers will vote on a by-law to grant a bonus of \$16,000 to assist in the reconstruction of the foundry of Cossitt Bros.

HALIFAX, N.S.—Walsh Bros. intend erecting a new building.—It is said that the Intercolonial Railway will build a new roundhouse and make other improvements in this city.

WINDSOR, ONT.—H. W. Mason will erect a sheet metal factory on Chatham street.—A by-law will be submitted to the voters in January to raise \$15,000 for erection of a new city hall.

CHATHAM, ONT.—It is expected that work will shortly be commenced on the electric road of the Chatham Electric Railway Co.—E. Wing is having plans drawn for a residence to be built on Raleigh street.

ARTHABASKAVILLE, QUE. — A wing 100x50 feet and four storeys high will be added to the Hotel Dieu.—Plans will likely be accepted this week for new town hall, although its construction will not likely be commenced until next spring.

BRANDON, MAN.—A deputation from the city council and Board of Trade recently waited upon the Dominion Government and opposed the building of a wooden overhead bridge over the C. P. R. tracks at this place. A steel bridge is desired.

BERLIN, ONT. — The courts will probably be asked to decide as to the site for a sewage farm for the town.—A project is on foot to build a large auditorium and rink on the site of the Huether brewery offices on Queen street.—J. Messner purposes establishing a trunk factory here.

EAST TORONTO, ONT. — The Ontario Government has granted the sum of \$5,000 towards the enlargement of the Bantyre Home.—A special committee of the council is preparing a report on the subject of providing an adequate water supply. Like Ontario will likely be the source of supply.

WALKERTON, ONT.—The councils of Culross and Greenock townships are asking government assistance for a scheme having for its object the reclaiming of about 15,000 acres of swamp
