#### WINTER FEEDING OF TURKEYS AND GEESE.

2. Also, for geese? Ans.-1. Moderate feeding on oats, wheat, and a very little corn, should keep your turkeys in good laying condition. Be careful not to overfeed. W. J. Bell, of Simcoe Co., Ont., one of our most successful turkey breeders, says on this point: "The breeders should be in only moderate flesh, and as the females have a tendency to become fat towards them at this time. The male, however. should have one good feed of wheat or oats each day." Of course, the turkey breeder must use judgment. 




