Glowing Tribute to Pauline Johnson

After the death of the famous Canadian poetess, the late E. Pauline Johnson, a poem entitled "And He Said, 'Fight On!'" was found by her bedside. This has been published, and the proceeds are to be devoted to a fund, part of which goes to Vancouver and part to Brantford, for a memorial to the highly gifted daughter of the Six Nation Indians, the loyal tribe who practically saved Canada to the British Empire. Some citizens of Brantford advocate a memorial window or tablet in the historic Methodist Church, while others are of the opinion that a Pauline Johnson section of a museum would prove as attractive a memorial as the Brant monument. It is generally realized that the county of Brant possesses many things of historic interest, and that a museum, especially a memorial one bearing the name of one of Canada's sweetest singers, would soon assume national importance. The name of E. Pauline Johnson will probably be commemorated by some monument in Vancouver, but it is more appropriate, of course, that her native town should pay her a tribute. Dealing with the proposals regarding a memorial, Mrs. Clementina Fessenden has summed up the matter thus: "The time is opportune for securing space for a

museum in the proposed addition to the Brantford Public Library. Experience proves that when once a worthy idea is accepted by the public it rapidly gains a foothold and grows with the years, and in this case would justly reflect the honors due to so distinguished a child of Brant county—a real Imperialist."—From "Echoes," organ of the Imperial Daughters of the Empire.

SUNDAY IN THE LOCAL CHURCHES

Inspiring Services Throughout City—Helpful Sermons.

MARLBORO' ST. CHURCH

On Sunday evening at Marlboro' St. Church a large congregation greeted Mr. Thomas Millman of Colborne St. Church, the speaker of the evening, who gave an excellent address, who took as a foundation for his sermon John 12:32, "And, if I be lifted up from the earth, will draw all men unto me." The speaker inferred that Christ at this time had reached the height of his popularity, and as a speaker and teacher was attracting considerable attention among the common people. Christ came to teach men God's simple plan of salvation which was so easy to learn and to accept if they would only believe on him. Christ's power to draw us to Himself is clearly manifested to-day and he is still the only powerful Saviour who can bring back a lost world to God.

Marriage Licenses Issued

BYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATION ANY PERSON who is the sole heir of a family, or any male over 18 years of age who has inherited a quarter section of the Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Agency or Sub-Agency for the land. Entry by proxy may be made in certain conditions by the mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of the intending homesteader.

During six months' residence upon the land in each of the first three years after the date of the homestead application, the homesteader must reside on the land in each of six years from date of the homestead application. The homesteader must reside six months of each year on the land, and must cultivate 20 acres of the land. A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right, and cannot obtain another, may enter for a purchase section in certain districts, price \$1000.00. This must be paid in full at once.
