OTHER SERVICES HELD

LONDON, July 6.—Simultaneously with the burial in Birmingham memorial services for the late Joseph Chamberlain were held in St. Margaret's Church, Westminster, Premier Asquith, the members of his cabinet, many of the late Mr. Chamberlain's colleagues in the House of Commons, members of the House of Lords and of the foreign diplomatic corps, together with a large number of persons prominent in the official and social life of the capital attended. A service also was held in the church of St. Lawrence Jewery, which adjoins the Guild Hall of the city of London and in which parish the late statesman's ancestors lived for many years.

THEY ALL STRUCK

WOOLWICH, Eng., July 6.—The entire working staff of 12,000 men of the government arsenal here which supplies most of the guns and ammunition for the British army, struck work this morning. The action of the men was a protest against the dismissal of an engineer who had refused to erect machinery on a foundation constructed by non-union laborers.
