WALTER JOHNSON IS BETTER THAN EVER

No doubt because he has lost more than his usual number of games at this time of the season, the report has been going the rounds that Walter Johnson hasn't as much stuff as he used to have. His own teammates refute this. Geo. B. Fridge, the veteran shortstop and captain of the club, says: "Johnson has as much stuff as he ever had. He is a better pitcher than he ever was, because he knows more about pitching. Now, Johnson has developed his curve ball, and whereas he used to rely entirely upon his tremendous speed, now he mixes 'em up. Johnson is what ordinarily would be called a hard-luck pitcher. To begin with, we never get the runs for him that we do for the other pitchers. Then a lot of batters who have given up trying to hit the ball out of the infield against Walter have begun to lag or hunt the hit on him.
