MR. S. A. JONES RETURNS FROM NORTH COUNTRY

Optimism Prevails There.
He Says, but Danger Is Not Yet Over.

Mr. S. Alfred Jones, K.C., arrived home last night from a visit to the fire-stricken district up North. He states that a good deal of optimism prevails among the people, and at Cochrane and other points some re-building has been started. He expresses the opinion that residents are running big chances even to-day, as a strong wind from any quarter would almost certainly lead to the wiping out of other places. From the train, fire can still be seen in various directions, and the air is full of smoke. Members of the 159th regiment from Camp Borden,

are helping in the region of England. Mr. Jones is of the opinion that many deaths have not yet been reported from outlying districts.
