1. By whom-Jesus Christ (v. 18). Jesus is the Son of God. Since h is equal with God, he has the right to call. Those who hear his call should render instant and hearty obedience. 2. The circumstances of their call

The call came to them while they were busy with their business inter ests. God always calls men who are vitally engaged in some business, not those in idleness.

When Christ calls men he does not call them to a lower service. This is a fine case of promo tion. Men catch fish to kill and feed upon them, but Christ's disciples catch men to make them alive and feed


