DEATH OF MRS. EVANS

The sad and sudden death of Mrs. John Evans, of Stewart, took place on Tuesday morning, after a few moments' illness.

The deceased lady was about 52 years of age, and was always in good health. On Tuesday morning she got up and was getting breakfast ready when she was suddenly taken ill. She was standing by the stove and said she felt a severe pain in her head, and, in walking towards her room, she fell in a fainting swoon on the floor. She immediately regained consciousness for a few minutes and then relapsed into unconsciousness. Medical aid was at once summoned from Merlin, but in an hour she was dead.

Mr. and Mrs. Evans came here from Indiana some four months ago, and Mr. Evans is interested in the oil business. The deceased was a sister of T. W. McLean, Baxter St., this city. She was formerly a resident of St. Catharines, and comes from one of the oldest and most respected families in that city.

She leaves, besides her husband, a family of three children, her mother, and twelve sisters and brothers. A remarkable thing about her family is that there were thirteen children, and her death was the first break in the family. The oldest is 54, and the youngest is about 30.

The remains were taken to Mr. McLean's residence on Wednesday, and were conveyed to St. Catharines yesterday for burial.
