A HOT DAY

Yesterday was the hottest day Chatham has had during the last three years, according to the figures registered at Turner's weather bureau. The thermometer was its highest at 96 degrees in the shade. The records before were 92 on the 6th of July, 1902, and 93 on the 8th of July, 1903. During the 8th, 9th and 10th of July, 1903, the thermometer registered 90, and during Saturday, Sunday and to-day the figures have also been over 90, only that on Saturday and to-day the thermometer registered 93, which was the same as the very hottest day last year. This is not news to Chathamites, for it was generally known in the city that yesterday was a very warm day.

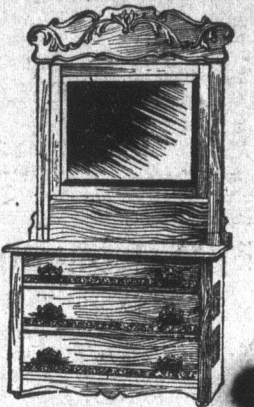
