A Third Candidate.

Labour Putting Candidate in Field

(Calgary Herald.)
There is a strong possibility of there being a third candidate in the field for the federal elections. A member of the executive of the Trades and Labor Council informs the Herald that the Dominion election organizer who is organizing every possible constituency for the forthcoming election will be in the city about the eighteenth of the month to organize the labor men of the Medicine Hat riding and if possible to make arrangements for the placing of a candidate in the field opposing C. A. McGrath, the Conservative, and W. C. Simmons, the Liberal.

IN LABOR CIRCLES

Edmonton, Jan. 17.—The Alberta executive of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada waited on the Provincial Cabinet on Saturday afternoon to bring to their attention a number of resolutions passed by the labor men for the purpose of improving the conditions of the laboring class. The delegation included E. J. James, miners' union, who was deputized by Vice-Pres. Lechey, and A. J. Healey, secretary. H. Wesman and representatives from local labor bodies interested in the proposed legislation. They were received by Hon. A. C. Rutherford, Premier; Hon. W. H. Cushing, Minister of Public Works; Hon. C. W. Cross, attorney general, and Hon. W. T. Finlay, Minister of Agriculture.

Among the resolutions brought to the attention of the executive was one asking for the appointment of scaffolding inspectors and also one for the appointment of factory inspectors. The delegation asked that all wages should be paid in current coin, instead of by checks, and that there should be at least a bi-monthly pay day.

Workmen's Compensation Act was agreed upon to be drafted along the lines adopted by the Imperial Parliament.

An amendment to the Boilers Inspection Act was asked for, to require elevators and control public utilities.

The examination and registration of steamfitters and plumbers was urged. This has been endorsed by the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, the Alberta Trades and Farmers' convention, Dr. Ternan, city medical health officer, and the Edmonton Trades and Labor Council.

A plea was made for a revision of the election laws, whereby an extension of time would be allowed to permit workmen voting after working hours, free from all inducements.

The total abolition of the contract system in all public works was asked.

A resolution was passed by the Alberta Trades and Farmers' Convention asking that the municipalities be given greater borrowing powers while the financial stringency continues, was submitted.

An application was made for adult suffrage in municipalities.

A request was made for the abolition of the system compelling candidates for the provincial parliament to put up a deposit.

Legislation was asked for to prevent the employment of children under 16 years of age.

Several resolutions were submitted regarding the operation of electric cars. Legislation for the protection of the lives of conductors and the

hours of labor on Sunday were among the points submitted.

A fair wage clause was asked for to be included in all contracts given by the government.

Application was made for several amendments to the Mines Act. It was suggested that the mine inspector should visit all coal mines in his district at least once in every six weeks, and should make a written report of the condition of that mine, the same to be posted at the mine mouth. This was recommended in the report of the coal commission.

Another request made was that in every mine where at least ten men were employed there should be a regularly-equipped wash house.

Another recommendation of the coal commission was endorsed by the labor men, who asked that escape shafts in coal mines should be a proper distance from the main shaft, 100 or 150 feet was suggested.

The government were asked to make it a punishable offence for a member of the mine committee to be discriminated against by their employers.

In connection with the handling of explosives at mines, it was suggested that a suitable place should be provided for keeping and handling these.

An eight hour day, bank to bank in mines was also asked for and the Premier said the same will be brought before Parliament shortly.

After a conference which lasted for three hours the labor delegates retired, confident that their suggestions and requests will be carefully and favorably considered by the government.

LABOR LEGISLATION FORESHADOWED.

From the speech from the throne, Edmonton: A bill will be submitted for your consideration providing for the regulation of the conditions of labor as regards compensation to workmen in case of accidents. I believe that by thus providing on an assured basis for the future the relations between capital and labor in this province will be rendered more cordial from the outset. It has been admitted in several of the most industrially advanced of the countries of Europe that the conditions under which the mining industry is carried on renders it peculiarly necessary in the interests of all concerned to impose some limit on the hours of labor in this occupation. A bill has therefore been introduced by my ministers imposing regulations in this respect which I believe will have a happy effect on this the most promising of our infant industries.

A bill will be submitted for your consideration dealing with the establishment of a government drainage system in the province and providing for the expense of important and necessary works of this description being assessed against the property benefited.

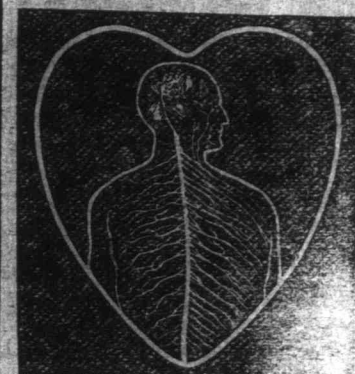
