## Ready to Race The Problem, 2.04 1-4, Against Zom Q., 2.09 1-4, Says Bud Tingley, His Owner

Houlton Man Declares That Ira Carpenter Does Not Own The Problem

"The Problem, 2.04, is ready to be raced for \$2,000 a side or any other amount against Zom Q., 2.09, any time," declared "Bud" Tingley, the well known Houlton, Me., horseman, over the long distance telephone to The Gleaner yesterday afternoon. It appears that an item which appeared in The Gleaner over the sale of an interest in Zom Q. to Fred Bishop, a wealthy potato grower residing near Houlton, has stirred up a regular hornet's nest in Aroostook. It was intimated in that article that Ira Carpenter, of Patton, Me., still owns an interest in The Problem, but Mr. Tingley asserted this was untrue and that he (Tingley) was the sole proprietor.

"Mr. Bishop is a particular friend of mine and assures me that he is not acquiring an interest in Zom Q. in order to go after The Problem," said Mr. Tingley, "but if the person who gave The Gleaner its information, or anybody else, wants to match Zom Q. against my horse for \$2,000 a side, I shall gladly cover their deposit."

From Fredericton he will go to Danforth, Me., for Saturday, July 3rd, thus starting off what promises to be a busy season for this popular official who has previously officiated at a good many tracks in New Brunswick.

## First Entries Received For Circuit Races Here

But It Will Be Last of Week Before Entries for \$5,300 Worth of Intermittent Closing Purses and Early Stakes are Listed—Adlof Guy, 2.00 1/4, Races Today

The first entry for the Fredericton Park Association's Maritime and Maine circuit races was received last night and some more came in this morning.

As a matter of fact the entries do not close until midnight tonight, and under the rules all those bearing postmarks until noon tomorrow are eligible, so that it will be the last day of the week before entries for \$5,300 worth of intermittent closing purses and early stakes are listed—Adlof Guy, 2.00 1/4, Races Today.

of the week before a comprehensive list can be prepared.

The first entry to come in was for the early closing stakes to be raced in September, and came from Aroostook county. It was significant that the same stables did not send an entry for the midsummer meeting, which may mean the horsemen of northern Maine are going to do their racing in the Potato Belt very largely until they start their fall excursions away from home.

Have Value of \$5,300.

Intermittent closing purses for the midsummer meeting and early closing stakes for fall, which close today, have a total value of \$5,300. There are six intermittent closing purses to be raced in July, each for \$400, viz: Free for all, 2.19, 2.22, 2.27, 2.30, 2.35 and 2.40. The free for all is valued at \$400; the 2.19 mixed, 2.20 mixed and 2.27, 2.19, 2.22, 2.27 and 2.35.

There seems to be a general impression that the Maritime and Maine circuit campaigns will be just about keyed up to their highest pitch by the time they strike Fredericton the last week in July, and that the races here should be about the best that will be seen on the circuit. The fall meeting will follow immediately after the Woodstock and St. John's, P.E.I., and will, it is believed, attract about all the horses racing at those two big meetings, as well as a good many that will be at Lewiston, Me., Fair the previous week.

Adlof Guy Starts Today.

Horsemen will be much interested in the racing today, Aug. 29, when where Adlof Guy, 2.00 1/4, makes his first start of the season at the Bay State Circuit meeting in a free for all that promises to be a corner race. The Boston Globe, referring to the Avon meeting, says:

"Owners and trainers have been waiting for the Connecticut meeting, with their three-in-one racing. Last week Woodstock was short of horses the fields averaging very small, while at Cherry Park, Avon, this week there are so many horses on the grounds that the meet, which opens tomorrow, has been extended to four days.

"There are twenty horses ready to start in the 1 1/4 mile race, the class that all last winter opponents of the time allowance race claimed would be killed by the presence of R. H. Brett.

"The Portsmouth, N. H., giant handled the 2 1/4 mile race last fall easily, but he has not driven anyone away from the Short Ship yet with his liberal time allowance. He may start in where he left off last year and continue to tramp his fields down all season, but he will have a lot of horses to heat every week just the same.

"There will be a record crowd at the little racing plant outside of Hartford tomorrow, as Adlof Guy, 2.00 1/4, Direct C. Burnett, 2.01 1/4, and Direct J. J. 2.01 1/4, have their first clash over a half-mile ring in the \$1,000 free for all.

"The three flyers have trained nicely and are as ready as possible. All three have had considerable experience on a double O. Burnett and Directum before going to the Grand Circuit.

"Adlof Guy's turf career has been mostly over the two laps, and for this reason he is likely to go to the post favorite.

"Will Hodson, who had Adlof after he became the property of the Ideal Stables, Endicott, N. Y., in midseason a year ago, will be behind him tomorrow; Will Crozier has Direct C. Burnett and Johnny Page Directum I.

"New Englanders saw the Providence horse last fall at Windsor, where he won with Murphy driving, just before George Whitney sold him to John W. Corcoran.

"The other events tomorrow are the 2-year-old and 2 1/2 mile, in the aged class it looks like too large a field to handle. If all declare in that the trainers say will, Manager Brazil will make two races of it.

"On Wednesday the 2 1/2 trotters, 2.20 pacers and 3-year-old trotters parade, and on Thursday the 2 1/2 trotters, 2.12 pacers and 2 1/2 trotters. On Friday there will be two divisions of the 2 1/2 pacing class and a 2 1/2 mile, entries for which do not close until Wednesday night."
