ASSEMBLY EN-DORSES UNION.

Is Ready for Amalgamation With Methodists if Latter Prove of Same Mind.

STRONG RESOLUTIONS.

Denouncing Laws Unfair to Women Against Gambling, And in Favor of Lemieux Act.

Hamilton, Ont. June 8.—As the result of a vote taken this afternoon, the motion to send the question of church union out to Presbyterian congregations, marked with the approval of the general assembly, was carried. The vote was 160 to 42.

Dr. MacKay's amendment favoring federation instead of union, was lost, 53 to 154.

The assembly then endorsed organic church union with Methodists and Congregationalists, carrying the resolution submitted yesterday by Prof. Patrick, of Winnipeg.

The question of Union is to be voted on by the congregations, after the question has been dealt with by the Methodist Quadrennial Conference Sept., 1910.

Hamilton, Ontario, June 10.—The General Assembly today adopted the following recommendation:

1.—The General Assembly has heard with gratification of the improvement in the enforcement of laws having a moral bearing and of the disposition shown by the Attorneys General of almost all the provinces and insist upon the police commissioners doing their official duty faithfully.

2.—The Assembly has heard with horror and shame of the extent of the traffic in girls for immoral purposes, commends the diligence of the Board in seeking to bring to account the heartless traffickers, and to warn or rescue their victims, earnestly protest against the disposition shown by some judges, magistrates, and police commissioners or constables to "license" segregate, or tolerate a vice sinful in the sight of God, loathsome in itself, and criminal in terms of the law of Canada, and of almost all civilized nations, and expresses the conviction that "discrimination" alike in social life and in the administration of justice against the weaker and usually less guilty sex is unjust, and indefensible and is responsible for much of the difficulty in suppressing prostitution, and earnestly call upon all concerned to do everything possible, so that men offenders are punished as severely as women.

3.—The Assembly commends the Minister of Justice, and the Government in leading Parliament to amend the criminal code prohibiting opium joints, and strengthening the laws against the traffic in immoral literature, and increasing the penalty for the awful crime of procuring for immoral purposes.

4.—Condemning the Government for not doing more to suppress race-track gambling.

5.—Whereas, the Assembly has learned with surprise that "Habitual" open and notorious adultery and habitual open and notorious lewd co-habitation are not unlawful in the present state of the criminal code of Canada, and whereas, these scandalous vices are unlawful in most American frontier states; and whereas, in consequence great numbers of those guilty of these offences are flocking across the line, and making Canada a refuge where they can continue their vicious lives under the aegis of the Union Jack; And whereas, the number of those disposed so to live is being rapidly and alarmingly augmented from the ranks of immigrants from Europe and the Orient, thus endangering the sanctity of marriage and the foundation of national virtue, therefore, the Assembly would respectfully

THE FOREST FIRES.

Ate up Miles of Woods Last Week. But are now Under Control.

Forest fires did incalculable damage during the past week. In this county there were fires round Boiestown, Blissfield, Renous River, Rogersville and many other places. The Rogersville fire burned eastwards to St. Margarets where the new houses of John Quinn and Matthew Ridley were destroyed with all their contents, also barns. Kouchibouguac was seriously endangered. The old station house at Ivory Crossing, Nelson, was burned. Fire also burned large districts in Gloucester.

A brush fire fanned by a strong southwesterly wind made its appearance on top of Dalhousie Hill and became so threatening that many people packed their belongings. The Dalhousie fire brigade turned out and with the help of citizens did good work in preventing the Presbyterian manse and other buildings from taking fire.

Rain on the upper St. John fell Friday night also some on other parts of the province. A heavy downpour on the Miramichi Monday night has settled the fires in this district. Everywhere the fires now appear to be under control.

6.—The Assembly is gratified to know that the Moral and Social Reform council of Canada has completed its organization, thus making possible the hearty and effective co-operation of all the Christian and moral reform forces of the Dominion and of the provinces in the interests of national righteousness and well-being, and authorize the Board to see that from time to time the Assembly is worthily represented on the Council of Canada.

7.—The Assembly is pleased to observe the growing usefulness of the Lemieux Act in preventing strikes, and promoting industrial peace and good will as between employers and employees, and notes with special pleasure the frequency and success with which ministers of the church are entrusted with responsibility of serving on Conciliation Boards.

8.—The Assembly deeply regrets the inadequate support of the vitally important work the board is called to do, authorizes appeal to be made to the church for \$11,000 for the work of the current year and earnestly commends the work to the support of all our congregations, missions, and the people generally.

DRUMMONDS COMING HERE.

Proceed at Once to Construction of The Necessary Docks.

TWO YEARS' START

For Newcastle, No Matter What May Develop at Bathurst Later.

At a special meeting of the Gloucester municipal council held on the 10th, addressed by J. J. Drummond, O. Turgon M. P. and T. M. Burns, resolutions were adopted pledging a bonus of \$25,000 to the Drummond company if they brought their railway from the iron mines to Black's Cut, thence to Bathurst harbor.

The guarantee was accepted and the railway will now run to Black's Cut instead of Bartibogue. This ensures to Bathurst the permanent location of the docks and whatever else may be the outcome of the rich deposits of iron ore in Gloucester county—if the harbor of Bathurst can be made fit for large vessels.

J. J. Drummond and his engineer, Mr. Parsons, met the Newcastle Board of Trade executive Saturday afternoon. On behalf of the company they accepted Newcastle's offer of a free site and promised to proceed to build docks here just as soon as arrangements are completed to build a spur line from the Intercolonial to the river front. They expect to be shipping ore from Newcastle docks before the close of navigation this year.

The company have abandoned their survey to Bartibogue and will connect their branch line from the mines with the Intercolonial at Black's Cut, four miles south of Bathurst. This will make the Intercolonial haul nineteen miles longer, but will, by keeping the branch entirely north of Nepisiguit River, avoid building a costly bridge, which would delay the construction six months.

Mr. Drummond said that the dredging of Bathurst harbor will take at least two years, so that the company would ship from here, this giving Newcastle in any case a start of two years on Bathurst. He urged the Board of Trade to exert all their influence to have the Miramichi dredged as to admit the largest vessels. If Bathurst harbor should materialize the company by that time might have enough business to keep two dock busy.

The board appointed Mayor Miller, Ald. D. P. Doyle and Mr. C. E. Fish, a committee to see about securing options on the right of way of the necessary branch from the I. R. C. to the docks.
