



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DR. WILLIAM HARKIN, M.P.P.

It is with regret that we have to record the death of Dr, William Harkin, M.P.P., which took place suddenly on Friday afternoon. The deceased, while attending to his duties. in the Legislature, then in session, was at-tacked by apoplexy, and fell from his sest in a state of unconsciousness. He was at once removed to an ante-room, but although every, thing was done for him that the combined skill of the medical members of the House could suggest, he lexpired in a few minutes. The House at once adjourned, and the body was taken to Vankleek Hill on the evening train for the east by Messes. MoMaster, Monk, Mack, Chisholm, Merrick, and Kerr. The deceased was to have dined in the even-ing at Government House, but on the mains-choly news of his untimely death being om-veyed to his Honour, the dinner was port-poned. Dr. Harkin, whose parents came from Donegal, Ireland, was horn at West Hawkesbury, Ons., in 1851. He was educa-ted at the Yankleek and L'Orignal High School, and gradinated as M.D. at MoCill University in 1858. In 1859 he married the daughter of Mr. Duncan McDonnell, of Yank-leek Hill. He was first returned to Parlia-ment in 1875, and was re-elected at the last general election. In politios he was a Liberal-Conservative, and opposed to the present Government. His death will be regretted by all who had the privilege to be acquainted with him.

St. CATHARINES, Fab. 141...The parties Sr. CATHARINES, Feb. 5 kl --- The parties in charge of the construction of the lock gates on the Welland, canal deposited recently six new lock grows at lock No. 2 on the new canel preparatory to ship-ping them into position H4 the locks. On Wednesday it was discovered, that some wanton scoundrel lind hacked all the six whirled around at this rate, striking the ceil-ing and other parts of the machinery at every revolution, until mangled al-most beyond sceegonibion.
