CANADIAN MURDERED IN MEXICO

Slain While Attempting to Protect an American Family from Bandits.

Mexico city, Jan 28.—An account of murder and savagery of which an American Mormon family and a young Canadian were victims reached here today in a private letter from Dublin, near Casas Grandes. Four bandits attacked and robbed the home of James Morlensen and brutally mistreated Mrs. Morlensen and a thirteen-year-old daughter.

Subsequently the latter was shot and killed while preparing a meal at the command of the robbers. An American by the name of Madison escaped and in reply to his appeal Marius Cox, a native of Canada, attempted to assist the Morlensen family, but fell dead under the fire of the bandits.

CHURCH BURNED

The Methodist church at Marysville, which was built thirty-eight years ago by Alexander Gibson, at a cost of \$65,000, was burned to the ground Sunday afternoon. The fire is believed to have come from a defective flue. It was insured for \$10,000. The house occupied by Principal W. T. Day adjoining was also destroyed. Loss \$2,000; insurance \$800, owned by the Alex. Gibson Co. Mr. Day's furniture was insured for \$1,000 which fully covers his loss.

TWO MEN KILLED AT MONCTON

Gleason was thrown over Moncton, Wednesday, as a result of one of the saddest and most terrible fatalities in the history of the city, in which Hiram Graves, a car inspector of the I. C. R., was instantly killed, and George Wilson, also a car inspector of the I. C. R., died some five hours later in the Moncton Hospital, both being struck by No. 2 express, about 10.15 a. m., while at their work, in the west end of the I. C. R. yard.

Mr. Graves is survived by a widow, who was a Miss Bleakney of Petticoat, and two sons and two daughters. The sons are Frank, I. C. R. brakeman, Moncton, and Joseph, living at home. The daughters are Mrs. Walter Wilmet and Mrs. Ward Lutz both of Lower Coverdale.

Mr. Wilson is survived by a wife, one son and three daughters. His eldest daughter, Mrs. Brougham McCready, has been living with him at his home on Cornhill street. The other children, two girls and a boy, are going to school. Mr. Wilson formerly conducted a boarding house on Westmorland Street.

ANNUAL MEETING OF N. B. GUIDES

The annual meeting of the Provincial Guides' Association which was held in St. John, Wednesday in White's restaurant, was the most successful yet held. A great deal of business was done for the benefit of the guides and many valuable suggestions were made. Premier Hazen and Surveyor General Grimmer were present. At the morning session the fee for guides' services was fixed at \$10 per day for one man, or \$18 for two. During the afternoon session complaints were made of the inactivity of the game warden in enforcing the laws.

The guides are desirous of having better protection and for that reason they will endeavor to have measures introduced, which will help them in their work. They will also ask the government to grant them a small piece of land on which to build. They claim that they have absolutely no protection in case of fire, or in case their holdings are destroyed in any way.
