THE sole head of a family, er any male over 18 years old may home-stead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskat-chewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain

## Silos In Western Canada



POR many years Western Canada average throughout the winter,

OR many years Western Canada and barn in the West.

The enormous areas is country. The enormous areas in the silo since it can be erected at roamed at will, or the settler cut his year's supply of native hay, to a large extent met the fodder problems of the country. With closer settlement and more intensified agriculture, however, a change is coming about. Particularly on account of the rapid advance of the dairy industry the farmers are becoming more interested in the various means of caring for their herds, especially during the winter months. The silo has been found to solve one problem, and is making its appearance in many parts of the country.

From experiments that have been undertaken at the various experimental farms it would appear that the silo method of feeding dairy stock is one of the very best. Superintendent G. H. Hutton, of the Dominion Experimental Farm at Lacombe, Albertz, claims that winter silage is one of the best means of keeping the farm stock well fed during the winter and has solved the problem of securing succulent feed for the dairy cattle.
