

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS

First snow of the season last Saturday. It required careful observation and a steady eye to see it.

Wheat mills at Portage, Prince Co., destroyed by fire on Sunday night. Insurance \$1,200.

Mr. J. H. Fergusson, former proprietor of the Island Argus, has received the unanimous nomination as Republican candidate to represent Brown Co., in the Dakota Legislature.

The steamer *Clifton* sailed for London, to-day with 3,545 cases of lumber, 855 sheep and a general cargo of lumber, etc. Mr. F. Blake accompanied his shipment of sheep, and Capt. John Leslie, of St. John's, was also a passenger.

The barque *Kate Stuart* which sailed last week from Summerside with 35,000 bushels of oats, shipped by owner, Hon. John Lefroy, went ashore at Bellefleur where she also lies stranded. Her situation is perilous.

Mr. RICHARD E. GALT, who recently resigned his position as Principal of Queen School, in this city, has been appointed Principal of St. Mary's Public School, Halifax. He will enter upon his duties on 1st November.

As Mr. McMillan has always manifested a lively interest in stock-raising, there is no doubt that he will attain eminence in his profession, and be a credit to the island.

Two respectable young men named George Gillespie, tinsmith, and George Thorne, printer, were arraigned yesterday at the Police Court, charged with committing an indecent assault upon a female member of the Salvation Army. The complainant swore positively to the identity of the two young men, but as they produced incontrovertible evidence in proof of an alibi, they were promptly discharged.
