 therefore the Liberals must be the bad men.  
 Mr. MacLean came out strongly for free food, free wheat and free agricultural implements. He is now a full fledged free trader. Of course like a true Liberal he had to have a share in the "blue" and he did that part of it well, having rehearsed it so often.

H. B. Ames.  
 Mr. H. B. Ames who followed said that after three years successful administration it was now possible to compare this government with others.

The minister of finance, he said was a Conservative optimist, who did not see shadows where shadows were not, and Canada was not that new country which, like the Kangaroo, went ahead by leaps and bounds with occasional intervals of rest. The year 1913 had been one of trying conditions which Canada was able to meet and overcome largely through the wise foresight of the minister of finance.

For many accounts paid during the year, also, this government had not been responsible. Some \$19,000,000 had been spent to provide for public works including the L. C. R. Canals, etc., public works which had to go on; the sum of \$12,600,000 had been spent on the N. E. R., \$2,800,000 on the Quebec bridge and \$15,000,000 on the Hudson Bay Railway. Which of these three propositions are the members of the government now in power responsible for? asked Mr. Ames. How could it be said these expenditures were due to the extravagance of this administration when the projects were originated before they came into power? The object of heaviest expenditure, however, had been railway subsidies. Last year there had been paid for these purposes the sum of \$19,026,236, almost enough to account for the entire addition to the National debt. And for these subsidies one had only to look back through the records of legislation to find they were not blameable on the present government.

The claim had been that the former minister of finance, Hon. W. S. Fielding, had made a much better showing. Was this so?

Turning back to the year 1907-8 it would be found that with \$96,000,000 revenue there had been an over-expenditure of \$11,000,000. In that year there had been ominous signs but had the finance minister but on brakes? Not he. He had instead added \$13,000,000 to the national debt of Canada in a single year. He had put on the brakes one year too late. He could not do it in 1908 (election year) for obvious reasons.

Gris Increased Debt Eighty-one Millions in Sixteen Years

Mr. Ames then stated that the net debt in 1896, when the Conservatives went out of power was \$258,997,000. In 1911, when they came back, it had totalled \$340,042,000, an increase of \$81,500,000 per year. In 1914, after three years of Conservative administration it was \$333,300,000. Thus in sixteen years the Liberal government had increased the debt \$81,500,000 while in three years the Conservative administration had decreased it by \$6,000,000.

Ottawa, April 8.—The first reference of the session to the naval aid bill of last year was made in the House this afternoon by W. F. Cocksbut, M. P., of Bonaventure. Mr. Cocksbut had replied to J. G. Turfitt on one of the budget speech and had completely riddled and disposed of the arguments of the Liberal speakers regarding the advisability of placing special credits on the free list as well as giving free wheat to the western farmer. In closing just a few minutes before six o'clock he adverted to the naval question. "I think it was too bad that the Senate of last year decided to turn down the bill by which it was proposed that this Dominion of Canada should devote \$35,000,000 to the assistance of the Empire navy. Sir George Ross, the leader in the senate, since passed away, was, we are told, an imperialist of the imperialists, and yet when a chance offered for Canada to liquidate a debt long overdue, he fell under some strange influence, what it was I do not know and opposed the measure."

"A voice—"It was the party whip cracking."  
 Mr. Cocksbut—"I believe it was the influence of the leader of the opposition."  
 At any rate there was an influence of opposition, a disgraceful influence I would like to have seen the leader of the opposition join with the government in a policy of aid to the British navy,

that would have been a united policy of the whole Dominion. I say we would have welcomed that, but it did not come. The Senate, I think, made a grave, a criminal mistake in turning down that bill. As a humble Canadian who occasionally visits the mother country, I feel ashamed of Canada's action, especially as I believe it did not represent the true spirit of Canada, but that on the contrary the proposal of the Premier had the support of a large majority of the Canadian people. I feel ashamed every time I go to England. I feel ashamed to step on the wharf at Liverpool when I reflect upon the blameworthy action of the Canadians. The Liberal party have made many mistakes, but I trust they will never again make such a mistake as this one."

A convention of foreign and American Surgeons held in New York on an exhibit was an artificial hand, which could be used for writing, manipulating a knife and fork and executing dozens of other tasks.

Seven lives were lost in a fire which swept the Allison district, Boston, early yesterday. It was a 40 room house and there were 125 persons living in it. The scopes of many of the survivors were most thrilling.

One of the most horrible fatalities occurring in Rockingham since Halifax lock place last Wednesday night when Miss Lillian Bayer was instantly killed by a train after she alighted from the car on its arrival at the station. Her head was fatally severed from her body. A sad fact is that the body was discovered by her aunt at an early hour next morning. When the young lady failed to return home her aunt started with a lantern search. Miss Bayer was 22 years of age and for the past four years was a student in Dalhousie University. She was noted as a most clever pupil.

There was a very small attendance at the market yesterday.

Donald Nicholson, M. P., arrived home on Friday for the Easter recess.

Premier and Mrs. Borden spent the Easter Parliamentary recess down South. They will return to Ottawa on Monday.

Advice from Winnipeg says the weather is reported from all over the west, and that many farms are now ready for seeding.

By producing 1069.59 pounds of herring in a year, a new record has been established by a Gurnsey cow at a Coast Farm at Berwyne, Pa.

The Belgian Aviator, Verchere, was killed on the 8th, by a fall from a height of six hundred feet. His machine caught in a squall while flying slowly miles above the water.

One man was killed and six injured in a wreck on the New York and N. H. R.R. at New Britain, Conn., Monday. Five of the injured passengers are seriously hurt.

Real bills have been seen flying twenty miles off St. Mary's Bay N.S., and thought to be from the missing Southern Cross, as the first definite indications of the fate of the vessel and 170 men.

The tugboat Edward P. sank in the Severing Falls St. John N. B. Saturday morning. The captain and two men forming the crew managed to launch a small boat and make their way ashore through the eddies.

A New York despatch of the 10th, says: Ten thousand people from all parts of Canada are here for Easter. The people here are popular in restaurants and the orchestra programmes. Many of the visitors are women here for the styles.

At Berwick station Ont., on the Canadian Northern Good Friday four men tried to cross Railway River in the storm. Their canoe overturned and Chief Higgins, John Brinkes and Albert Brinkes were drowned. G. S. Smart was rescued.

John Krachensky, whose trial for the murder of the Bank Manager at Plum Point, Manitoba, came to a close at Montreal, Man., Thursday last, was found guilty, and sentenced by Chief Justice Mathers to be hanged on July 24.

Of the total of \$225,277, estimated expenditure of the Provincial Government for the current year, as tabled in the Legislature by Premier Matheson, the sum of \$100,732, will be paid for education, and \$39,119 for permanent bridges, to.

The four gunmen found guilty of the murder of Gambler Hornum, Rosenthal, the electric chair, at Sing Sing, New York, N. Y., as a result of a trial there. Rev. W. W. Cannon, Catholic Chaplain of the prison accompanied Dege Frank to the chair. Two Jewish Rabbis were with the others.

The Algonquin Hotel at St. Andrew's, N. B. was totally destroyed by fire on Monday with the exception of the concrete additions built in recent years, nothing of the wood work remains. The fire started about noon on Saturday from a charcoal spark beneath the shingles on the roof while repairs were being made.

The usual grand display of Easter beef was in evidence at the stands in the market at the Easter Market Holy Saturday. Several carcasses shown were as fat as was ever seen here and would be difficult to beat again. Several carcasses of spring lamb were also on exhibition and for sale. The attendance in the market building was not very large.

Holy week and Easter—in St. Dunstan's pro-Cathedral in this city the ceremonies appropriate to Holy Week and Easter Sunday were fully carried out with as much precision and solemnity as the limited accommodation of the edifice would afford. "Tenebrae" was sung on the evenings of Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, by His Lordship the Bishop officiating, assisted by Rev. J. N. Frazier, as organist. Rev. Father McDonald, as soloist, Rev. Frank McQuaid, as Sub-leacon, and Rev. Fathers Duffy and Hughes as deacons of honor. Rev. Dr. McLaughlin was master of ceremonies at all the solemn services of the four days. The Blessed Sacrament was solemnly borne in procession to the basement where a suitable repository had been arranged. His Lordship again officiated at the morning offices and Mass of the Prose-Office, on Good Friday with the same solemnity as on the previous day. The Blessed Sacrament was borne back to the upper church in the same solemn manner as was witnessed on Holy Thursday. On Holy Saturday Rev. Pius McDonald was celebrant, Rev. J. N. Frazier was deacon, and the "Exultet" and "Lauds" were sung, and Rev. Joseph McDonald, as organist, Rev. Pius McDonald and Rev. Frank McQuaid as deacons and Sub-leacon respectively and Rev. Fathers Frazier and Duffy as deacons of honor. The service of the day was presided at by Rev. Mr. Stewart, Secretary to the Diocese. His text was the 4th, verse of the 1st chapter of St. Paul's Epistle to the Romans: "Who was predestinated the Son of God in power according to the spirit of holiness by the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ from the dead." His discourse was an eloquent and admirable exposition of the doctrine of the Resurrection. St. Clement's Feast and Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament took place in the evening, His Lordship officiating, assisted by the same clergy as at the Mass.
